SLAUGHTER HOUSE FOR PROJECT NEARS COMPLETION

With the meat shortage hitting the Nation which is simultaneously effecting Cha-Center's meat supply under the new rationing system, a bit of good news was released by the Ag Dept. this morning with the construction of the slaughter house to be completed within two weeks. The slaughter house will be used chiefly for the hog project when completed.

The project workers are currently working full force under manpower shortage conditions which has compelled the office workers to go out and pour concrete and construct the house; much credit is due to the swine dept. who are working in adverse conditions under the supervision of the Kobayashi Brothers. The initial slaughtering of the hogs are expected on April 12 under normal feeding conditions.

The caring and feeding of 500 hogs requires considerable manpower under unpleasant conditions which are prevailing at the present time but the workers have braved the situation so far with little compensation from the residents in an effort to meet the subsistence needs.

The group is expected to work on a tomato plant deal at the I-K-I Farms in Nevada. Some 150 more workers will be needed by May 1, Sakemi predicted.

Sakemi is planning to continue on to Ogden in order to look over some other farm deals. He hopes to be back on April 10 with more contracts for Poston farmers.

"More and more openings in agriculture can be expected for evacuees," Sakemi said.

It was reported that the group which went on a tour of sugar beet farms in Montana and Idaho is expected back this week.

BAKERSFIELD OILERS COP AA CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE! NEARLY 5500 SEE OILERS NOSE OUT BEARS IN CAGE CLASSIC

Mighty Bakersfield five avenged last Sunday's defeat, by annexing the coveted Unit I "AA" Sportsmanship crown to their string of honors, defeating a strong Golden Bear five by a close 34-33 margin in the final playoff before a capacity record crowd of nearly 5500 fans, on Court 13, Sun. March 21. This loss to the Golden Bears was a disappointing one as they battled neck to neck with the Oilers to the final gun.

The first quarter started with George Mizuno, ace forward of the Bears, sizzling the basket for 6 points; but the Oilers retaliated to end the first period in a draw 11-11. Second quarter found the battle in a seesaw with both teams matching their shots "bucket for bucket" but Bakersfield tightened their effective man-to-man defense to hold down Mizuno scoreless to end the half 22-19 in their favor.

The third frame opened with Oiler's Mac Okuma setting the pace to widened the gap to 7 points to end the quarter 32-25. The last quarter found the Bears staging a final rally with Aki Mochizuki sinking a potshot to lead the fray temporarily 33-32, but Danny Fukushima, the "hero of the game" came through with a difficult angle shot in the last minute of the game to give the Oilers a undisputed 34 to 33 victory.

The high scoring honors went to Fukushima of the Oilers with 11 and followed closely by the Bears' Mizuno.
