

PROCESSING PROCUREMENT REGULATED

Although repeated memoranda have been issued regarding the congestion governing procurement requests, it has been reported that the situation has yet to be improved. Therefore in Administrative Order No. 18, A.W. Emple and Ralph Gelvin have requested that processing or procurement requests be limited to strictly emergency requirements.

As an initial step towards alleviating the present emergency existing in the procurement and Fiscal Division concerning processing of purchases and payment of accounts, all Division heads have been requested to anticipate their needs for the period from April 1 to June 30 and to submit requests for purchase to care for needs during this period as soon as possible. Such requests must be in the Procurement Division before 5:30 p.m. on Mar. 31.

It was stated that thereafter no request for Purchase would be processed except for subsistence and Health Sections, unless the Division Head can prove that the need could not be anticipated prior

RESIDENCE IN CENTER BARS WORK WITH PRIVATE GROUPS

Evacuees who work for private contractors must live outside of the Center, a wire from WRA Director Dillon Myer stated yesterday. The only exceptions to this ruling are previous commitments such as the camouflage factory.

The wire from Myer was in reply to a query sent by the Project, asking whether residents may be employed on a private road construction job within the Center, under the same sort of set-up as workers in the camouflage plant. If approved, the plan would have given private employment opportunity to approximately 200 residents.

Now, to be eligible for employment by the road contractor, evacuees must obtain indefinite leave and establish residence outside the Center, the WRA ruled.

ORCHESTRA WINS HIGH ACCLAIM IN DEBUT CONCERT

Poston's 40-piece symphony orchestra won high acclaim in its initial concert performance on Monday night at the 310 stage in Unit III before an appreciative audience. The marvelous music of the evening's program included 8 numbers.

While waiting for induction orders to go to the army camp at Shelby, Mississippi, the volunteers have been guests of honor at a succession of banquets, dances and parties within the center.

Last Sunday marked the first anniversary for ground breaking ceremonies for the Colorado River War Relocation Project held on March 21, 1942 by U.S. Army engineers. On this occasion, Poston residents were able to look back on a number of accomplishments, including an agricultural venture, hog farm, chicken ranch, and construction of school buildings from adobe bricks made on the project.
