



TRANSPORTATION GUARANTEE NEEDED FOR SEASONAL WORK

Transportation both from and back to the center must be guaranteed before work contracts on seasonal jobs are approved by the Employment Department, Vernon R. Kennedy, chief of employment declared yesterday. This precaution is taken for the protection of the workers and in accordance with WRA instructions.

"All contracts must bear the approval of the Employment Division before being presented to the workers," Kennedy said. He indicated that all contracts must be signed in the unit leave offices as well as the Employment Division.

WRA regulations stipulate that passage both ways must be provided either by the employer or government agency before evacuees are permitted to leave.

To date, the sugar companies contacting workers here have been prepared to pay only passage from the center, believing that the United States Employment Service should be responsible for paying the return fare.

TCC ASKS RECONSIDERATION OF WRA RULING ON ROAD CONTRACT WORK

The Temporary Community Council of Unit I, through its secretary, Franklyn S. Sugiyama, wired the War Relocation Authority to reconsider its recent ruling which prevents evacuees residing in centers to work on the road contract under terms similar to the camouflage project.

Sugiyama, in the wire sent out yesterday,

pointed out the fact that the contract would permit workers to accumulate funds "to avail themselves for indefinite leave."

The wire read: "Road contract only for five months, a short term. The general feeling toward the project will be improved by your approval on the same basis as camouflage workers."

GASOLINE TO BE ALLOWED FOR EVACUEE CARS STORED IN CALIFORNIA

Evacuee residents who are contemplating on relocating and have cars stored in California may apply for emergency gas ration coupons which will provide for sufficient gas from the point of storage to their ultimate point of resettle-

ment destination, it was announced yesterday by Len Nelson.

"While evacuees will not be permitted to re-enter military zones, they may make provisions with some "friends" to drive it out of the military area. Nelson's office will, upon application, issue emergency gas coupons which may be mailed to their friends.

When applying for gas coupons, the applicant must bring all pertinent information concerning their car, such as the motor serial number, the 1943 state license number, etc., and the title must be the name of the applicant.

Passenger cars and trucks may be thusly brought out of California, with the O.D.T. issuing the clearance certificates for the trucks.

An A card will be issued to all evacuees with cars who are leaving Poston for resettlement purposes.

THREE AWAIT TRIAL FOR THEFT CHARGE

The three young men who were sent to Phoenix on Federal misdemeanor charges and on recommendation of the local judiciary commission, are awaiting trial, it was disclosed by E. L. Miller, chief of Internal Security.

The trio will be arranged before and prosecuted by the Federal judge after Attorney General Riddle approves prosecution of the case.

The charge was entered as a misdemeanor instead of a felony since the amount of theft was less than fifty dollars.

VOICE OF A NISEI

The Nisei's cause, as far as the nation's press is concerned, was enhanced last week by the editorial voice of Collier's, the national weekly mag, commending the action of the War Department in affording the loyal American-Japanese a chance to fight for their country. All those favorable press reports of the past few weeks have tended to counteract much of the Hitleristic and bigoted expressions of the Pacific Coast race-baiters. But there is much yet to be done.

Obviously, it is impossible to expect our American friends on the outside to do all the work in laying the basis for an amicable post-war world. The Nisei themselves must participate grimly in easing and justifying the burden carried by those millions who are faithful to the American-born Japanese. Aside from volunteering for service, it is not enough for individuals to just work in war industries and on farms or to just buy war bonds and stamps, participate in Red Cross activities, etc.

The Nisei must assist their Caucasian friends combat the forces of intolerance and demagogism on the home front in a concerted, organized manner, for in unity there is strength. The Japanese AMERICAN CITIZENS League, with its respected recognition by government agencies and national organizations, certainly seems to offer the loyal American Japanese an opportunity to participate to that end.

The JACL, as consistent champion for the rights of Americans of Japanese ancestry, has been granted permission to file legal briefs on behalf of our constitutional privileges in both federal and state courts. Its spokesmen appear in legislative halls and hearings; they speak and plead our case before regional and national conventions of influential organizations; they face accusing cross-examiners in political investigations.

While cooperating during the military evacuation, the JACL HAS NEVER ADMITTED SUSPENSION OF OUR CITIZEN PRIVILEGES. It has now actively entered court trials, as "Friend of the Court," where citizenship and property rights have been challenged. This is the 1st time in history a Japanese American organization has filed such a BRIEF in any court and, THE NISEI WILLING, IT WON'T BE THE LAST TIME.

At present Takashi Onami, Henry Chuman, William Tanaka, and Tom Taira of Blocks 13, 14, 46 and 39 respectively, have resigned with more expected to follow suit. Blocks 46 and 13 have found replacements in Takase Morioka and Saito, but blocks 14 and 39 are yet undecided.

More information regarding the reorganization of block managers will be released later.

POSTON SYMPHONY IN BRILLIANT CONCERT FEATURING CLASSICS AT COTTONWOOD BOWL TUESDAY

Postonians Leave Center

Before an appreciative and attentive audience of approximately 1,000 music lovers, the 40-piece Poston Symphony orchestra under the directorship of Maestro Michael Sosnowski made its initial appearance in Unit II in a beautiful program of orchestral selections Tuesday evening at the Cottonwood Bowl. From the opening strains of our National Anthem to the closing notes of the "American Patrol", Maestro Sosnowski enthralled his audience.

The program included the following numbers: "Tales from the Vienna Woods" by Straus. This number revealed the smooth workmanship of the string section and its dancing familiar rhythms thrilled its listeners. The "Second Movement" from the Surprise Symphony by Haydn was performed excellently. From the softest staccato notes at the opening with its developing crescendos and diminuendos showed the gaiety with which Haydn composed and titled this composition.

"Sarabande" by Bohm revealed the broadness and strength of the orchestra with good accents from the entire group.

"Kamenoi Ostrow" by Rubinstein with its exquisite melody running from beginning to end recognized the brass section which brought out important phrases at various intervals.

Two short numbers, "Intermezzo" from Cavalleria Rusticana by Mascagni with its soft sweeping melancholy broadness and "Barcarolle" by Offenbach with its familiar enchanting strains captivated the listeners.

"Ballet Egyptienne", first and last movements, expressed the alertness of the orchestra members in following their leader with its quick stops followed by rests. The oriental air of this number could well be understood by those listening.

Truly, a symphony orchestra of the caliber such as was evident Tuesday night would measure up to any similar organization in other communities.

The forty members practicing weekly for approximately four months have accomplished a great deal toward rendering this program for the music lovers of Poston and to have such an organization in our midst is indeed a privilege.

All interested instrumentalists have been

asked to participate for the enjoyment and advancement of their own musical careers and willingly, they have given of their time to make such programs possible.
