

INDUCTION SET FOR VOLUNTEERS

CAMOUFLAGE NET WORKERS TO CONTINUE PRODUCTION

Workers in the Poston camouflage plant voted Wednesday night at a mass meeting to continue striving for maximum production while waiting for a satisfactory disposition of their grievances, it was revealed in yesterday's press release from the Employment Division.

The meeting was called by the shop committee when the workers learned that the management had arbitrarily reduced the ceiling pay of non-weavers from 18 percent to 14.08, in violation of the contract clause which stipulates that the amount of such reductions must first be agreed upon by the parties concerned.

The arbitrary action by the management resulted in a 50-cent per hour cut in the wages of non-weavers.

Regarding this situation, the employees took the following stand as voiced in their resolution:

"Although the employer has violated the terms of our contract as well as the laws of the State of Arizona, we, the workers in the Poston Camouflage Net Factory, realizing the vital importance of the nets to the national war effort, pledge ourselves to maintain maximum production, pending settlement of our grievances by the shop committee or, if necessary, by the War Department of the United States."

A spokesman of the workers pointed out that not only was the change in pay for non-

HOSPITAL TREATS 5340 PATIENTS IN FEBRUARY

Rush business was done by the Poston General Hospital for the short month of Feb. Out patient treatments numbered 5340, 1735 patients visited the dental clinic and the optometry division reported 516 patients.

Major hospital cases totaled 115 of which 61 were medical, 29 obstetrical, 13 surgical and 12 pediatrics. Only 3 cases were referred to outside hospitals for the month. 142 patients were admitted to the hospital for the month while 143 were discharged.

weavers affected without consulting the workers but it was made retroactive to March 1.

In making out the checks, the management prorated the non-weavers' wages for the first pay period in March on the basis of a .1406 ceiling. The non-weavers voted without dissent to refuse the checks until they were paid on the scale specified in the contract.

Volunteers for the Nisei combat unit will probably be inducted between April 10 to 25, WRA Director Dillon S. Myer informed Ralph M. Gelvin, associate project director, in a wire received here yesterday.

Induction of all volunteers within the 9th Service Command, which includes Poston, Gila, Manzanar, Tule Lake, and Topaz, will be at the center, according to the telegram from Washington.

The above information was released as a result of Gelvin's efforts to obtain definite information regarding the induction date and induction procedure for volunteers.

While many of the volunteers are reported to have filed applications for indefinite leave clearances or transfers to other centers prior to induction, Gelvin stressed the desirability of having enlistees remain on the project. The difficulty of gathering up volunteers scattered all over the country was pointed out.

SOAP TICKETS VALID FOR MARCH ONLY

Residents of Poston are reminded by the C.E. that soap tickets are valid only during the month of March. Residents who have not used their ticket are urged to do so immediately in order to avoid last minute rush to the canteens, which carry limited amount.

CHARGES TO BE MADE FOR CASHING PERSONAL CHECKS

During the past months the C.E. have taken the initiative in cashing checks for the residents of Poston, in view of the fact no banking institution exists for a city of 18,000 population, but due to increasing amount of checks cashed and the charges made by the banks in handling the accounts of the C.E. for deposit items, it is now necessary for the C.E. to charge the residents cashing checks.

Checks will be cashed on the following basis for personal and certified checks: \$15--.05; \$16-\$100--.10; \$101-\$125--.15; \$251-\$500--.20; \$500-\$1000--.25; \$1000 and over .35.

The charge will not be made for evacuee cash advance or clothing allowance checks. In case of refund of rebate checks of small amounts up to 50¢ no charge will be made, however, no personal checks in excess of \$15.00 will be cashed at any store. All scheduled charges will be made regardless of purchases.

SAVE CONTAINERS FOR AG. DEPT.

Vegetables for the mess halls will be delivered in bushel baskets instead of crates or boxes due to shortage and difficulty obtaining the containers it was disclosed by James Ito of the marketing Div.

Residents as well as mess hall workers are urged to cooperate in conserving the baskets in order to insure future deliveries to their mess. Residents have taken the initiative in utilizing the baskets for waste baskets and laundry that have been used previously by the dept., according to information. It is strongly requested that such practice be discontinued by the people when the baskets are used by the dept., further more, all empty boxes and crates delivered by the steward's office be salvaged for future use.

The newly established Bureau of Social Relations, whose duties are to be in charge of the mediation and settlement of various disputes occurring within the blocks, was finally decided to include the following members: Vice Chairman of the WCC, Vice chairman of Issei Advisory Board, Representative of the Christian Church Group, Representative of the Buddhist Church Group, and Representative of the Executive Committee.

5 PLAYERS REJECTED IN EXCITING CONTEST

PINGPONG MEET WON BY UNIT 2

Before an audience of approximately 2,500 Postonians, sharpshooters Kei Matsushita and Utaka Nakamura paced the 213 Terrors to a 36-26 thumping over the unfortunate Penguins of 211 last night on Court 229, in the final encounter of the championship play-off series to capture the Poston II "AA" Title. The victory automatically entered the 213 five in the Poston I Elimination Basketball Tournament slated for Sat. and Sun. March 27 and 28.

Taking the lead from the starting whistle with a charity throw by U. Nakamura, the Terror aggregation never relinquished the advantage as Kei Matsushita consistently found the range of the basket and Lloyd Onoye dependably mastered the backboard to hold a comfortable 19-12 lead at intermission time.

With the championship title at stake, the second half saw both quints playing a little harder and rougher which accounts for the 29 fouls committed during the contest and the Penguins Capt. George Inagi and George Hirozawa leaving the game on four personals before the ending third period whistle was sounded with the Terrors clinging to a 28-22 lead.

In the final stanza, midget Tony Nakazaki and Tod Hirozawa showered the bucket with a barrage of long shots in a last minute desperate attempt to overtake their opponents, but the Terror guards, G. Soda and L. Onoye, saw to it that the Penguin attack be halved as they tightened their defense. In the final stages of the fourth period, the Terrors Shig Morimune and K. Matsushita left the contest on fouls as did Tod Hirozawa for the Penguins. With two and one half minutes remaining and the majority of players of "B" caliber, the Terror pace slowed down considerably, as the Peng-

uins attempted desperate mid-court shots, but found the 213 lead too great to overcome.

Individual high point honors of the contest went to Army Volunteer Kei Matsushita, spearheading the Terror scoring attack with 15 pts. Despite his considerable height disadvantage 5 ft. 1 inch Tony Nakazaki found the range of the basket for 9 markers to lead the Penguin offensive.
