### CAMOUFLAGE NET CONTINUE PROMUCION

Workers in the Poston camouflage plant voted1 Wednesday night at a mass meeting to continue striving for -maximum production while waiting for a satisfactory disposition of their grievances, it was revealed in yesterday's press release from the Employment Division.

The meeting was called by the shop committee when the workers learned that the management, had arbitrarily reduced the ceiling pay of non-weavers from 18 percent to 14.08, in violation of the contract clause which stipulates that the amount of such reduc-tions must first be a-greed upon by the parof mount fies concerned.

The arbitrary action by the management resulted in a 50 cents cut in the per hour wages of non-weavers.

"Although the employer has violated the terms of our contract as well as the laws of the State of Arizona, we, the workers in the Poston Camouflage Net Factory, realizing the vital importance of to the nathe nets effort, war . tional pledge ourselves to promaintain maximum duction, pending set-tlement of our grieour grievances by the shap committee or, if necessary, by the War Department, of the United States."

Checks will be cashed on the following basis for personal and certified checks: \$15.-.05; \$16-\$100--.10; \$101-\$125--.15; \$251-\$500--.20; \$500-\$1000--.25; \$1000 and over .35.

The charge will not be made for evacuee cash advance or clothing allowance checks. In case of refund of rebate checks of small amounts up tp 50¢ no charge will he made, however, no personal checks in excess of \$15,00 will be cashed at any store. All scheduled charges will be made regardless of purchases.
