**LEAVE CLEARANCE
 PROCEDURE DECENTRALIZED**

Speeding up of the granting of indefinite leave permits will be possible under a new procedure just announced in Washington, according to Project Director W. Wade Head. The new procedure eliminates in some cases the time which previously has been required to secure Washington approval after a job offer has been received at the center.

Indefinite leave for employment may hereafter be issued by the Project Director under the following conditions: (1) Advance leave clearance has been approved in Washington; (2) The job offer has been sent in by a WRA relocation officer. Under the new procedure, indefi-

**SCHOOL TO PURCHASE
 TYPEWRITERS**

In a letter dated March 17, Dr. Miles Gary of the Ed. Dept. had been informed by Dr. Willard Beatty, Indian Service, Education Dept. that 90 typewriters are available for purchase by the Ed. Dept. of Poston.

According to a memo sent to A.W. Emple, Chief Adm. Officer, Dr. Gary stated that the Ed. Dept. will purchase 83 typewriters through a revision of the current budget for education.

The block of 83 machines will be distributed among the schools and for vocational training

nite leave may also be issued by the Project Director to parents joining their children, wives joining their husbands, women planning to be married, and to children under 17. For children under 17 leave clearance has never been required.

The presence of WRA relocation officers in major centers of employment opportunity and the increased number of persons with advance leave clearance have made the decentralized procedure possible. The majority of the year around job offers now being received at employment office are sent in by field relocation officers. They have already been checked for wages; working conditions, and community sentiment.

Residents who receive jobs offers directly will also find that the new procedure cuts down the time required to obtain indefinite leave. Instead of getting Washington job approval, the project employment office is now authorized to request the field officer stationed closest to the location of the job offer to make a check of working conditions and community sentiment. Immediately upon notification of the field officers that the job is satisfactory the project director may issue indefinite leave, provided the resident has advance leave clearance.

UNIT I SCHOOLS EMPLOY 182

One hundred eighty two employ-ers that are "absolutely essential without whom the life, health and security" of the community are employed on the Poston I school staff according to the list sub-mitted to the Manpower Commission of the Poston I One, by Dr. Miles E. Cary, Director of Ed.

Of the 182 that are employed they are divided as follows: dir-ector's office, 8; high school, 53, elementary school, 38 and nur-sery and kindergarten, 43.

Quoting Dr. Harris' view in the connection of allotment of man power in the work of the schools, stated in his memorandum to Dr. Cary, with which Dr. Cary has expressed his hearty accord: "I feel that the essentials for the maintenance of life, health and security of the residence of Poston must be re-oriented to the program for re-relocation. Work-ers for the project,----- all are being given essential experi-ence which only the school pro-vides. The manpower commission must not commit the error of con-sidering the schools as a project department competing with other departments for manpower in the same basis with those departments. Arbitrary limitation of the edu-cation program would react auto-matically in limitations upon the future efficiency of all other departments depending upon evacuee employees, upon the prospects of our young people for re-relocation and upon the sense of security of all evacuees as residents of the United States."

UNIT I ADMINISTRATION CONSOLIDATED

The major departments of the four administration buildings have been consolidated into the build-ing which was formerly the old hospital annex. This was done when the Labor Relations Board moved in the now called Unit I Administration building.

The departments being scatter-ed throughout the four Ad. build-ings caused much delay and confu-sion between department heads but now hope to function more smooth-ly.

The departments in the Unit I administration building are as follows: Executive Board, Labor Relations Board, Unit Administra-tor, Executive Assistance, Block Manager's Supervisor, Truck Dis-patcher and Conference room.
