

ARMY EXAMINER FOR VOLUNTEERS DUE APRIL 1

Army officers are expected to arrive here on April 1 from Phoenix to give physical examinations to the vast number of volunteers to be inducted into the U.S. Army according to Geo. Kurata, chrmn. of the Labor Relations Board of Unit I.

The date for the examination has been set for April 2 and 3, but the time for the three units is yet to be set, stated Mr. Kurata. X-Ray plates and other materials will be here at the same time for the examinations of volunteers.

Mr. Kurata said that details for the examination will be released later.

TCC PASSES FOUR RECOMMENDATIONS

Four recommendations were passed at the Unit I TCC meeting that was held last Sat. Mar. 27 at the Adult Education quarters in Blk. 36.

The recommendations passed were: (1) That

the family of the deceased be allowed the choice of cremation or burial in Poston at WRA expense, (2) That the charge of \$175 be assessed for fishing license to all evacuee males over 18 years of age; while no charge be made for women or males under 18 years of age.

(3) That the recommendation made by the Manpower Commission to the Proj. Dir. to approved for the following: that 19 dollars be paid monthly to members of the departments listed: police; firemen, lifeguards, Hospital staff but nurses aides excepted. All warehousing, all transportation, cooks; and assistant cooks, fiscal division, procurement, personnel, mails and files, leave office project employment, school operations, personnel employed on rationing cards, irrigation, food processing road maintenance, machine shop; building maintenance, utilities; block administration, agricultural, decretionary staff.

The Manpower Commission was not quite through with the list: (4) To the above list, in lieu of cooks and assistant cooks, the TCC recommended that the head cook in each mess be permitted to place a total of 15-20 members of the kitchen staff on the \$19 a month list, depending on the numbers eating in the mess.

BETTER EMPLOYMENT POSSIBILITIES OFFERED

Offers of employment for a power machine operator and lay-out man, stenographer clerk and sales correspondent were among the new jobs offered evacuees, according to a release from the Employment Division. The offers, all coming from Cleveland, Ohio, indicated a trend towards better and better employment as the WRA relocation offices accelerated their efforts.

Basic pay for the machine operator is 75 cents per hour. The lay man, who must cut canvas and read blue print receives \$1.20 an hour. \$31.20 weekly is offered a shipping clerk.

A manufacturing firm is asking for the stenographer clerk at \$108 starting pay per month. Two girls as checker and trimmer at a curtain manufacturing concern were wanted at 50 cents an hour for 48 hours of work per week. The sales correspondent will receive \$125 per month.

Another opportunity was for a lithograph worker. The wage is 70 cents per hour plus hour and a half pay for overtime. Anyone with lithographic experience will qualify, but training was not required if the applicant was able to cut cloth from a pattern and to do ruling pen work.

OILERS CAPTURE POSTON CHAMPIONS BAKERSFIELD ROUTS GOLDEN BEARS IN FINAL PLAYOFFS 33-18

The Bakersfield mighty Gilers steam-rollered to the Poston Inter-Unit Championship by trouncing the weakened Golden Bears by a decisive 33-18 margin at Court 13 before a slim crowd of 2500 sweating spectators last Sunday, March 28.

The Bears and the Oilers reached the All-Poston finals on Sunday by eliminating the Unit II Terrors and the Unit III San Diego "AA" champions by the count of 26-21 and 38-29 respectively the day before. The Oilers "King of the Poston Courts" finished their basketball campaign in a blaze of glory by handing the Golden Bears their worst licking. This was Oil City five's fourth cage title, having already under their belt the Unit I "AA" Sportsmanship League title, New Years' Festival Sports-O-Cade Basketball Championship at Unit II and the City-Wide "Open" Basketball Tournament Championship. The Poston Champions suffered the only loss of the season to the Golden Bears in the "AA" League finale by a close two point margin to spoil what otherwise would be a perfect season.

Bears terribly missed the services of All-Star George Mizuno and Joe Kadowaki. Without the two regular Gee-Bee aces, they were just another ball-club as the Oilers ran roughshod in the second half through the leaky zone defense to pile up a comfortable margin for a decisive victory.

In the most part the game was unexciting and rough with many fouls committed going undetected. Danny Fukushima proved to be the hero as they pulled away from the tired and desperate Golden Bears.

The GeeBees got off to a fast start by taking a one point lead at the end of the first quarter. In the second quarter each team matched buckets with the Byle Height lads still clinging to a single point lead at the intermission by the score of 10-9.

Regaining their old time form, the Oilers went on a scoring spree in the second half by peppering the hoop for 4 digits while holding the Mizuno-less Bears to three field goals and two free throws.
