Unless the applicant presents a written advice from the manager of the field office referring him to the central office, the latter will not consider his case.

EVACUEES MUST LEAVE CENTER FOR PRIVATE EMPLOYMENT

"Evacuees who wish to engage in private employment at prevailing wages have the right to do so under WRA leave regulations," Dillon S. Myer, WRA Director, wired from Washington to the TCC in answer to the latter's query regarding possible employment on the road project on the same basis with camouflage work.

"WRA encourages evacuees to leave the center and return to normal life," the wire read. "Recent acceleration of clearance procedures, job placement activities in midwest and provisions for paying travel expenses where needed are intended to make it easier for evacuees to obtain outside employment and leave.

"We feel to permit development of private employment opportunities on projects would interfere with fundamental relocation policy and create unnecessary administrative problems because of double wage standard in center."

The above wire was released by Franklyn Sugiyama, chairman of the TCC.

LEAVE OFFICE HOURS TO CHANGE

Minors may be allowed to change "no" answers on questions 27 and 28 on the military clearance questionnaire, Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, hoped according to his letter of Mar. 16 to Franklyn S. Sugiyama and Dr. H. Mizushima of the Temporary

Community Council. However, he stated that he could not make a commitment.

The letter from Mr. Myer was in answer to queries on the subject submitted by the TCC. His letter follows:

"There is certainly a great deal of reason in the point you make regarding youngsters under 21 being held accountable for their answers to questions 27 and 28.

"While I sincerely hope it will be possible to give them an opportunity to change their answers when they attain majority, I cannot make a commitment that this will be done for the reason that by that time the war may be ended and the WRA out of existence.

"The only reason, of course, that boys of this age were asked to register is because the ages of Selective Service registrants are 18 to 65."

COUNCIL NOTES 65+35 DIVISION FOR NET WORKERS

After lengthy and heated discussion between several representatives of the camouflage workers, councilmen and departmental heads, the Community Council at a special meeting with the Issei Advisor, Monday evening, voted for the division of 65% for the workers and 35% for the trust fund, retroactive to opening date and subject to change in future.

Representing the camouflage workers, Moto Asakawa, requested for a division of 65% and all earnings over 1500 square feet for the net workers, and 35% for the evacuee trust fund. Proposition of 65%-35% division was approved but the plan to give full amount over 1500 sq. feet to workers was rejected.

Deductions for pay period which is twelve days were pointed out as follows: twelve dollars and fifty cents for subsistence, 5% for over twelve dollars a week for Victory tax, and 1% of gross earnings for social security tax.

最近の市俄古トリビエン紙は「米國及布哇の日本人となる暮下に太平洋沿岸を遣はれ居る客所に抑留されて居る日本人十萬七千五百及布哇の日本人に關して次の如き社説を掲げてゐる。『布哇日本人數は十六萬中三萬六千が非市民である。彼等の存在は實際脅威であるが彼等は監禁されてゐないと同地軍事知事エモンス中將は発表してゐる。之は彼等の勞力が即ち砂糖ハイナツブル耕作に必要の爲の或は免て不思議な現象であ

他の理由が明記されてゐない」と言ふ更に沿岸白人十萬の中に住んで居る十萬の日本人が我々に害するであらふとの理由から監禁さるたが、太平洋防備の第一線である布哇の人口の三分の一を占むる日本人は自由に置かれるべきである。もし彼等の抑留が必要であるとすればそれは全く間違つた場所にて行はれてゐる。抑留日本人の三分の二は米國市民であるが之は米國憲法上から免て不思議な現象であ

る。裁判の有無に拘らず米國市民がその人種如何に依つて抑留されようといふ言ふ理論がなり立つべきであらうか。若し或他の米國市民が收容所に監禁され得ると言ふ事があり得ればそれは全米國市民にとつての大問題である。法律的に米大審院の判決はないが如何にして裁判所が全米市民を平等に待遇せしめて人種的立場から彼等の抑留を是非することが出来るだらうか？ 最後に此のチレンマは四つの自由の豫言者に任せてるべきである」と結んでゐる。
