INTERFERENCE FORCES MORSE CODE CLASS TO SHIFT HOURS

AUTHORITY ON RESETTLEMENT WILL SPEAK TO RESIDENTS

George E. Rundquist, executive secretary of the Committee on Resettlement of Japanese Americans, arrived late Monday night in Poston, his fourth stop in a proposed tour of all ten relocation centers. The purpose of his trip, Mr. Rundquist said, is to clarify the resettlement program and to study and solve problems evacuees may have to present.

Mr. Rundquist is willing to speak before Community Councils, Block Managers and any other group interested.

in presenting queries regarding any phase of the resettlement work.

Having visited all of the WRA field offices, Mr. Rundquist will be able to explain the preparatory work being undertaken to clear the way for employment of evacuees. The prospective employer, fellow employees, labor unions, and housing are all investigated before any job is referred to the WRA centers.

After the preliminary work has been done, however, the evacuee himself is solely responsible for the reaction he creates in the new community. It was pointed out that many have succeeded in winning the confidence and friendship of the American people, thereby making further relocation in that area easier.

"The first few," Mr. Rundquist declared, "bear a heavy burden as ambassadors of good will in the community they move into." He warned against the concentration of Nisei in any one area as such a tendency would jeopardize the welfare of the majority.

Mr. Rundquist is expected to be in Poston at least until Saturday. Sponsors of the Committee on Resettlement of Japanese Americans are the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, Home Missions Council of North America, and the Foreign Mission Conference of North America.

ZIMMERMAN TO SPEAK TODAY ON RESETTLEMENT TOPIC

Continuing his series of talks on "So You're Going to Leave Poston!" the Adult Education Dept. announces that Mr. Zimmerman, WRA Employment field man, will make his third appearance this Wednesday evening, April 7, at the Blk. 36 Mess Hall beginning from 8:00 p.m.

Following his stay in Poston, Mr. Zimmerman will go to Detroit, Mich. to open a WRA employment office in that city.

At the two previous meetings held last week at Blks. 11 and 42, considerable interest was shown by both Nisei and Issei. An interpreter will be there for the benefit of the non-English speaking members of the audience.

Although Mr. Kennedy did not know what his instructions would be, it was believed that he may be asked to investigate employment possibilities for evacuees in the free zone of eastern Washington and Oregon.

SUBSTITUTE FOR SOAP ON SALE

With the freezing of soaps until further augmenting of supply, accelerated by rationing of all soap sales in the future, a bit of good news was released by the C. E. yesterday in regards to the arrival of new sudless cleaner.

The new cleaner known as "Kelite" will officially go on sale to day; at 22 cents per box, according to C. Y. Yuguchi, store manager. "It sure is a 1 pound 10 oz. of dynamite which can be used for dish, glassware, silverware, paintwork and paintbrush," said Mr. Yuguchi.

It was stated the new product is concentrated 17 times the ordinary powder soap, therefore, only $\frac{1}{2}$ the usual amount of soap will be required for laundry, in addition to two tablespoons of the Kelite. The new product will not be "rationed".

C.E. EMPLOYEES ENJOYS SOCIAL

Approximately 100 employees of the C. E. were well compensated for their services rendered to the community recently when the Board of Trustees appropriated a fund for social functions, which was held at Mess 32 last Saturday night.
