

SANTA FE RAILWAY WORKERS TO LEAVE FOR KANSAS

Santa Fe Railway representatives, recruiting laborers for track work in Kansas, reported yesterday that the first contingent of evacuees will leave Poston next Tues. morning April 13. Registration for the first shipment will close this Thurs. night, the railroad officials stated.

Representatives of the Company will be at the field employment offices for the rest of the week and possibly for the remainder of the month, according to F. M. Puttroff, in charge of the recruitment after the departure of J. C. Brown, Santa Fe superintendent.

'REC' STAFF CANNOT RECEIVE PERSONAL DONATION

In a memorandum to the Unit I. Blk. Mgrs. John Powell, Assistant Chief of Community Service, stated that in several instances donations of cash have been made by the block audiences to the performers were employees of the community activities Dept.

It has been the rule of the department that where the project is paying the entertainers and teachers to serve the people of the three units, no personal donations may be received by them. Any money in appreciation should go to the department itself through the coordinator or the business managers in each unit.

OUTGOING BAGGAGES TO UNDERGO INSPECTION

Baggages and crated furniture of Poston residents departing on indefinite leave from the center will be carefully inspected before they are released, Ernest L. Miller, chief of internal security announced yesterday in a prepared statement to the Chronicle. A similar announcement came from Administrator John Evans.

Persons planning to leave should obtain a property clearance form from the Leave Office. This form must be signed by the employer, Block Manager, Block Manager's Supervisor, and the Internal Security Inspector. These signatures must be obtained before packing and crating.

When the baggage truck arrives at the apartment or block office to pick up the baggages, the inspector has already seen that no Government property is being taken. (Mr. Evans' report revealed that some people has attempted to pack up Army blankets in their baggages.)

The Internal Security Inspector will then sign the Property Clearance Form, and turn it in himself to the Office of Internal Security. This will give clearance so that crates and suitcases may be taken by the baggage truck to Parker for shipment to the destination of the person leaving.

Hand baggage needed on the train must be submitted for inspection and then turned over to the baggage truck. It can later be claimed at the Parker station by the owner. In cases of mothers having small children or in emergency cases, hand baggages will be permitted.

The procedure will be facilitated if residents cooperated by having the luggage ready for inspection and moving upon the arrival of the baggage truck.

Domestic Jobs Predominate In Outside Offers

A large majority of outside employment offers are still in the domestic field, the latest list of jobs released yesterday by the Leave Office disclosed.

Of the fourteen different offers, only three were non-domestic. These asked for technicians experienced in optical work; a textile factory worker, either male or female, to assemble mops; and a couple and two men for work on a farm.

The domestic work was of the usual order calling for maids and couples and gardeners.

The above batch, however, were not considered as attractive, and not indicative of the better employment offers noted recently.

GARAGE LOOTED BY CULPRITS

The new garage and service station located across the main highway was looted of two electric motors and fans, valued at \$30, which were removed from the circulatory system, last Monday night by burglars who entered the building through the windows of the men's locker room, according to George Yanase and "Shorty" Fitzwater, shop foreman.

One hundred gallons of gasoline was siphoned from the tanks of the service station located on the grounds adjacent to the garage during the same week.

DRIED FRUITS GO ON SALE

All dried fruits will go on sale immediately at the canteen and prices have been reduced 50% with only a limited amount on hand according to Bob Uragami, store manager. It was also disclosed that frozen foods are now available at the canteens.

TELEPHONE SWITCHBOARDS FOR UNIT TWO

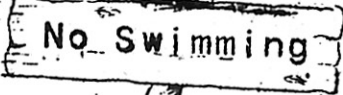

WASHINGTON POST URGES RETURN OF FARMERS TO WEST COAST AREA

The Washington Post, leading-daily in the nation's capital, urged in an editorial Sunday that "trustworthy evacuees" of Japanese ancestry be returned "to their former homes" on the West coast in order that there might be a "substantial increase" in food production.

"While the country is trying desperately to get men back on the land and the President is talking about a land Army to be composed of inexperienced youths, we hope that official Washington will not forget that thousands of expert Japanese truck gardeners are still in WRA camps", the Post declared. "The release of those Japanese whose loyalty to the United States has been established would not, of course, solve our agricultural manpower problem. But it would substantially increase the output of food in some areas".

"Justice and fair play demand that American citizens of Japanese origin be reabsorbed into our economic life as soon as that becomes feasible. And the shortage of agricultural labor gives that argument special urgency at the moment", the Post noted. "Many an acre of fertile land would be brought back into war service by allowing trustworthy evacuees to return to their former homes".

"The decision as to whether they may do so rests with the Army", the Post said, pointing out that "if the Army fails to modify its evacuation order, the WRA will face a more difficult task of getting these agricultural workers back on the land in other parts of the country."

The Post editorial also stated: "Less than 5000 of the Japanese who were evacuated from the West coast have been relocated outside of camps. Some of them are on indefinite leave and others are working in the vicinity of the camps. Nearly 107,000 are still in the custody of the War Relocation Authority. It is particularly short-sighted to maintain such a large number of persons

in comparative idleness at a time of manpower shortages, unless there are compelling reasons for doing so. And in the case of loyal and law-abiding Japanese no such reasons are apparent.

"The Japanese were evacuated from the West Coast in the time of confusion that followed Pearl Harbor when there seemed to be no immediate means of separating loyal citizens from potential spies and saboteurs. Now there has been ample time to examine records, to observe the conduct of individuals and thus to draw a distinction between loyal and law-abiding aliens of Japanese origin on one hand and potential enemies on the other. Men who have followed the Relocation movement closely believe that a majority of the Japanese now in Camps could be released without any appreciable risk. That is particularly true, of course, of the American citizens who have never been to Japan and of the older aliens who have spent most of their lives in this country".

RESETTLEMENT CHIEF SPEAKS ON OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT

At a special meeting of Block Managers Mr. George E. Rundquist, Executive Secretary of the Committee on Resettlement, spoke on the many problems the evacuees leaving the centers for outside employment faces and what the Friends Service Committee and the War Relocation Service are doing to educate and sometime combat, and pave the way for the Japanese leaving for outside employment.

The Service and the WRA has set up field offices in Chicago, Cleveland, St. Louis, and nearly 50 other large mid-western cities, set up Committees on Employment, Employer and union acceptance, housing and social contacts to pave the way for the Japanese. The Committee, to date, have been able to greatly neutralize active opposition.

To facilitate outside employment the WRA will arrange for cash grants, equal to cost of transportation, plus \$3.00 a day for meals and \$50 cash when you arrive. And the procedure for leave clearance--the big bottle neck at the present time--will be changed to speed up the clearance and allow the worker to reach his job within a reasonable time.
