

NEW ORDER TO SIMPLIFY BLK. MGR'S. PROPERTY RECORDS

The Administration has determined that in order to simplify the property records of the Block Managers, and make them more efficient, the following procedure shall be followed in regard to property distribution for the use of residents within the blocks, according to information released by Iwao Aoki, Supervisor of Blk. Mgrs.

1. When a person leaves the Project for any form of leave (indefinite leave, short term leave, group leave etc.), he shall check in the property used by him (cots, blankets, mattresses, covers) to the block manager.

2. When a resident returns to the project from a short term or group leave, etc. the block manager will requisition for such equipment as is needed for the use of the resident in the usual manner.

This will be effective as of Apr. 9, 1943 and retroactive to all individuals who were granted clearances previous to this date.

PRODUCTION OF TOFU STARTS IN UNIT 1

With successful test runs of tofu manufacturing processes made last Fri. and Sat. in Unit 1, located in the Industrial District South of Blk. 61, the factory officially went into production yesterday morning. Test runs conducted proved that top quality Soya Bean Cakes can be produced in Poston in mass quantities in spite of the opinion of "expert" who claimed that hardness of water, lack of humidity in the air, and other obstacles would cause failure of proper coagulation of bean paste particles.

Under the management of Henry Miwa of the Dept. of Industries, the factory will supply the mess halls in Unit 1, with the initial supply going to section 1 and Blk. 32. A crew of 15 workers under the supervision of Tomoji Wada and Masayoshi Yamaguchi, technical experts, will operate in alternating shifts to turn out bean cakes in large quantities. The production is expected to double in the near future with the addition of one grinder and caldron which will enable distribution to mess halls once a week. At the present time maximum production of 300 cakes per day has been established, sufficient to supply one section per day.

FIREMEN TAKE 'A' ALL POSTON CHAMPIONSHIP
