DEWITT VOICES OPPOSITION TO RETURN OF JAPANESE TO COAST

FOURTH ARMY COMMANDER WON'T TRUST JAPANESE

Lieut. Gen. John L. Dewitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command and 4th Army, expressed vehement opposition to any plan of returning Japanese Americans to the West Coast.

"A Jap's a Jap" and "it makes no difference whether he is an American citizen or not," Lieut. Gen. Dewitt is reported to have said in testifying before the House Naval Affairs subcommittee on Tuesday. The story was carried by Associated Press wires.

According to this report, Lieut. Gen. Dewitt isn't worried about the Germans and Italians on the Coast, but "the Japs we will be worried about all the time until they are wiped off the face of the map."

Representative Anderson was said to be expressing the sentiment of all three Coast states when he yelled: "If you send any Japs back here we're going to bury them."

The statement regarding the Japanese came when the general was asked if the committee might assist him on any matter he suggests.

The order freezing travel in the southwestern area of Arizona since last Tuesday came because of an epidemic of infantile paralysis in the Parker region.

PERTINENT ADVICE....

So you're planning on going out too? Swell! Here's wishing you luck, guys and gals. But permit me to restate a pertinent observation made by the columnist of the Poston Lampoon (If it's okay by you, Bob): "If you take a position, stay a few weeks and walk out on your employer for no reason at all. It will do all of us a lot of harm and you'll make yourself a brand new enemy; and we need all the friends we can get, not enemies. Besides, the man might be influential."

Them's downright good words, and we trust that every resident departing from the center to steer their way into the normal (however normal it can be during war-time) channels of American life will always remember those words.

Other timely bits of advice from those who are in positions to know what they're talking about are: be careful of choosing the proper associates; attend church, if at all possible, act discreetly in public. One unfavorable, embarrassing incident involving an evacuee will cause hardship on all persons of Japanese ancestry. Disreputable acquaintances will hardly be the sort to scrape up, so be ultra-conservative in making new friends. Remember when you leave this center, you have the added responsibility of selling yourself as a good citizen so that others still incarcerated in the centers may follow in your footsteps.

In a memorandum to Dillon S. Myer, WRA Director, the Unit II Temporary Community Council is requesting a raise from the present status of \$12 for unskilled laborers, \$16 for skilled workers \$19 for the Professional to a minimum wage of \$30 for unskilled, \$40 for skilled and \$50 for professional.

SUMMARY OF CHICKEN POX RELEASED

A summary of the chicken pox epidemic as released by the Unit III Medical Clinic reveals that in all, 147 cases which is 33% of the population were reported on October 12, to Nov. 11, there were one or more cases not reported, thus accounting for the spread of chickenpox.

The first outbreak of the minor epidemic was on Nov. 11, 1942 in which there were cases reported. The epidemic hit its peak in December with 55 cases reported. There were ten outbreaks in all with a two weeks interval between each outbreak. The average duration for each case was approximately two weeks with cases ranging in age from four months to 33 yrs. of age.

The last case was reported on March 20, 1943, according to the report.
