

# EVACUEES UNABLE TO RELOCATE MAY RE-ENTER CAMP

Clarifying a phase of the resettlement program, Project W. Wade Head announced yesterday that evacuees who leave the Center on definite leave may return if they cannot relocate themselves successfully.

"An individual who leaves the Center to resettle does not forfeit his right to return if he so desires," Head said. "However, we hope that the number of people coming back to live in the Center will be small; we sincerely hope that every one who leaves will successfully integrate himself with the economic and social patterns of American life."

But in event a person finds that the obstacles to successful relocation are insurmountable, he may negotiate for his return with the relocation officer in the area. This procedure is imperative for anyone contemplating return, it was pointed out, since it is necessary that the Project

have some advance so that it would be prepared to furnish food and housing to those who come back.

## C.E. ACCEPTS STAMP NO. 17

Residents who are in possession of ration stamp No. 17 may purchase shoes at the C.E. stores according to Hugh Anderson, assistant administrator which are valid until June 15. Shoe ration certificates issued to the residents which are valid for 30 days from date of issue may be renewed upon the holder's request. It is not necessary to renew at the time of expiration except when the holder is contemplating upon immediate purchase.

This procedure applies to evacuees leaving the project as well as those changing from one department to another. If the notice is not given, the department head is authorized to refuse job releases.

Mr. Zimmerman stated that he has received several complaints stating that the net factory was not cooperating in this regard, but Walt Bilicke, factory mgr. said he will help to carry out orders.

# WE TRUST IN DEMOCRACY - DESPITE DEWITT

On April 13, President Roosevelt took time out from his many duties to participate in the dedication of a shrine in the memory of Thomas Jefferson, author of the Declaration of Independence. The President, in paying tribute to Jefferson as the apostle of freedom, reminded his people that our country was again fighting a great war for freedom. Solemnly he said, "Today in the midst of a great war for freedom, we dedicate a shrine to freedom."

Ironically enough, on the same day Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, he who was cited with a congressional medal for his part in the eviction of all those of Japanese descent from the Pacific Coast, definitely aligned himself with the bigoted race-baiting forces and labeled himself as an apparent believer of Axis-ism. When asked if he had "any particular problem" to bring before a congressional naval affairs subcommittee, he answered, "Yes. I don't want the Japs brought back to the West Coast from relocation centers for employment or for any other purposes...I don't care what they do with the Japs, so long as they don't send them back here." Gen. DeWitt had the blind audacity to infer that Americanism can be measured only in terms of color. It is to wonder what our allies, such as Madame Kai-Shek, the Filipinos, the Negroes and the Indians, think now of Mr. DeWitt.

It would not be surprising if Gen. DeWitt was honored with other medals...the Iron Cross from Herr Hitler and whatever emblems Mussolini and Tojo confers on their heroes. In speaking of Jefferson, President Roosevelt said, "He believed, as we believe, that men are capable of their own government, and that no king, no tyrant, no dictator can govern for them as wisely as they can govern for themselves." Mr. DeWitt, apparently, believes in himself as a dictator, trying to ruin the lives of loyal citizens, much as Hitler is ruining the lives of his own people.

Lt. Gen. DeWitt completely overlooks the fact, as have so many selfish, demagogic politicians and business interests, that there are thousands of LOYAL AND FAITHFUL American citizens in the relocation centers. Fellow citizens on the outside talk of sacrifices. But how many of them have been forced to sacrifice as much as these Japanese Americans simply and purely on the basis of their racial strain and yet have maintained

their faith in America? Is it possible that Lt. Gen. DeWitt is motivated by more than just military reasons in insinuating that all persons of Japanese heritage are disloyal?

Gov. Earl Warren of California in proclaiming Jefferson Day said: "All true Americans regardless of political affiliation should pledge faith today to the ideals Jefferson fostered--IDEALS OF HUMANITY, EQUALITY, NATIONAL INDEPENDENCE AND PERSONAL LIBERTY FOR WHICH WE ARE WAGING WAR TODAY." That is precisely what all loyal Japanese Americans are sacrificing and fighting for today. There will soon be over 10,000 Nisei in the armed forces of our country. They enlisted, a great many of them voluntarily, because they believe in democracy. Lt. Gen. DeWitt has committed the folly of falling right into the arms of Axis propagandists...that America is disunited, that democracy is a failure.

NO, this is NOT admittance of the shallow faith of Nisei in America! On the contrary, they harken to the words expressed by President Roosevelt: "Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart; it is not a matter of race or ancestry." They harken to the President's words when he spoke of Jefferson: "He faced the fact that men who will not fight for liberty can lose it. We too have faced that fact."

"He lived in a world in which freedom of conscience and freedom of mind were battles still to be fought through--not principles already accepted of all men."

The American Japanese too realize the fact that MEN WHO WILL NOT FIGHT FOR LIBERTY CAN LOSE IT. For the Nisei, too, love liberty, and that's why they're fighting. Gen. DeWitt, the American Legion and the NSGW have shown the American Japanese, as well as Madame Chiang Kai-Shek, that not all men have accepted the principles of which the President remarked.

"Thomas Jefferson believed, as we believe, in man," stated President Roosevelt. "He believed, as we believe, in certain inalienable rights. He, as we, saw those principles and freedoms unchallenged. He fought for them, as we fight for them." The President's words might well have emanated from the lips of any loyal American citizen with a Japanese face.

The Nisei stakes great faith in the words of our President, a President who symbolizes the true objectives of what we are fighting

## LEAVE CLARIFICATION SIMPLIFIED

Despite the fact that the procedure of leave clearance has been explained several times, literally as well as verbally, it was revealed by the Leave Office that several factors remained unclear in the minds of the majority concerned.

A simplified clarification for the benefit of those contemplating applying for leave clearance was issued.

Leave clearance will be approved if the individual is qualified under specific reasons as follows:

- 1-mass registration on form 304A (military) or WRA 26 revised (female citizens and aliens)
- 2-his answer on question 28 was an unqualified affirmative.
- 3-he has not applied for repatriation or expatriation
- 4-he is not a paroled alien
- 5-he is not a Shinto priest
- 6-his application for leave clearance has not been suspended.

In other words, the above simply states who may apply for leave clearance.

To secure indefinite leave, all that is required is a job approved by one of the WRA field offices located at Salt Lake City, Denver, St. Louis, Kansas City, Mo; Chicago, Cleveland, or other regional offices in the country.

## HOSPITAL APPEALS FOR NURSE'S AIDS

The Poston General Hospital, facing an acute help-shortage, appealed today to residents of Unit 3, through the chronicle, for 10 orderlies and 25 to 30 Nurse's Aids, who are wanted immediately. This work will serve as a training for any girl interested in a regular nursing career and at the termination of the training period the graduates will be given a regular nurse's diploma.

Arrangements for housing will be made by the Hospital Management and uniforms and shoes are to be furnished free. A pay scale of \$16.00 for the first month and \$19.00 thereafter, has been approved and submitted to Mr. Wade Head Project Director, by the Manpower Commission. Mr. Head is expected to approve the Manpower Commission's recommendation.

All those interested are urged to contact the Employment Office immediately as this is a real emergency.

## PACKAGE INSPECTION TO BE DISCONTINUED

According to a Post Office announcement, beginning today, there will be no further Parcel Post and Express inspection by the Military Police. Hereafter the package will be delivered direct to the block Managers Office of each block where the residents may secure their own package. This will eliminate the mile long trek, through the hot sun to the Post Office for residents.

## COUNCIL ADOPTS CODES OF OFFENSE

The Unit III Community Council, has accepted and adopted, subject to change later, Administrative instructions #85 (codes of offense) and also a traffic code for the Community of Poston which, together with instructions #85 will hereafter govern all decisions handed down by the Judicial Commission, it was officially announced today by K. J. Takashima, chairman of the Unit III Council.

Takashima also stated to a chronicle reporter that the Council will, following this final warning, crack down on private enterprise within the Community of Poston, which is forbidden by Administrative instruction #26. "Private Enterprises", was explained as Sales of Consumers goods, repairs and services and operators of gambling establishments. This warning along with notices which will be sent to each blocks, will serve as the final warning.

The Council also appointed Chairman K.J. Takashima, Mack Kabotani and Masao Otani to serve on the permanent board of Trustees for the Evacuee Trust Fund.
