ANSEL ARTIST UNIOS PRIZE AT NAT'L ART EXHIBITION

gifted Nisei artist in Topaz, and . plaudits an Artist Fund Prize for her two entries at the Art Association's recently held annual Exhibition of Drawings and Prints, according to a report in the California Arts and Architecture magazine (April issue).
