

ARIZONA CHIEF APPROVES TRADE RESTRICTION BILL

With the influx of evacuees entering Phoenix and its vicinities House Bill No. 187 was submitted to the secretary of State, Dane E. Garvey, of State of Arizona, which has been approved by the governor of the state on Mar. 23, 1943. The measure was submitted as emergency act in order to preserve public peace, health and safety, stating for immediate operation.

The bill to be submitted at the 16th Legislature at its regular session effecting business relations with restricted person reads; whoever enters into any contract, agreement or understanding written or verbal, involving business relations; purchases, sells, trade, or exchange any real estate or personal property; commodity or thing, except goods, wares and merchandise for personal consumption, from a person whose movements are restricted by operation of law or by any executive or other order authorized by law or from person not eligible to citizenship, shall give notice of the transaction not less than three times in a newspaper of general circulation.

Exceptions to the bill are: acting on behalf of an agency of the U.S.; dealing with or on behalf of the Indian Wards of the government; dealing at wholesale or retail in wearing apparel; food supplies, medicine or spirituous liquors.

DR CARY LAUDS WRA EFFORTS ON RELOCATION.

Dr. Miles E. Cary, Director of Education, who returned from the Denver Conference of Education Directors recently, stated that he had not realized the extent of the WRA efforts to promote successful relocation. They have established offices, scattered in the Midwest, to locate jobs for those who wish to find outside employment. The whole emphasis of the conference was on relocation.

General DeWitt's opinion of Japanese on the West Coast, he said it must have been stated as coming from Mr. DeWitt and not from Lt. Gen. DeWitt, as it was directly contrary to the stated policy of President Roosevelt and also of the WRA.

He encourages those in the Relocation Centers to keep faith in our government and our President, not to expect immediate results, but trust in them to look after our ultimate welfare.

CONTRABAND GOODS STILL BANNED

While army inspectors have been withdrawn from the local express and post offices, Associate project Director Ralph M. Gelvin yesterday emphatically reminded the residents that the ban on contraband goods is still in effect.

Until authorization is received from the headquarters of the Western Defense Command, residents are not allowed to be in possession of guns, cameras, radios with shortwave units, etc.

State License For Professionals To Be Repaid

All professional men who are now actively engaged in their practice in the W.R.A. work corps will be repaid from the camouflage factory dividend for their state license fees, association dues, delinquent fees, and once publication for the group, it was announced by the T.C.C.

It was urged that the individual professional men immediately pay their fees and dues to avoid further delinquency penalties.

HEAD, GELVIN, EVANS OBSERVE FIRST PRINTING OF CHRONICLE

ALL MEN EQUAL - EXCEPT ???

It was bitterly cold. The south wind breezed through the valley. It felt like taking a sudden morning dip in the icy North Atlantic surf. The sun made a feeble effort to stab thru the clouds. And the snow... It wasn't gently flaking down just on the hard, brown earth; it was also making contact with human bodies that once were warm... bodies that were no longer protected from the freezing elements... tattered clothes and shoeless... bodies that were starved.

It would have been easy for George Washington and his valiant men to give up the fight that cold winter in Valley Forge. It doesn't require much nerve for any man to "throw in the towel." It's so easy to say, "Aw, what's the use!"

But Washington and his men knew that they were fighting for stakes that concerned not only themselves but their posterity and of future generations of fellow citizens. **THEY REALIZED THAT THE BEST THINGS IN LIFE WERE NOT TO BE HAD FOR THE ASKING. THEY KNEW THEY HAD TO FIGHT FOR WHAT THEY WANTED... liberty, life, the right to live their lives as free men. And they knew that no cost was too great to attain that goal. THEY DIDN'T GIVE UP. AND THEY TRIUMPHED.**

The Japanese American, too, face a crisis. They are beginning to realize, if realize they had not as yet, that democracy is not just an empty word, that it is a vital, living force for which Washington, Nathan Hale, Lincoln and the Unknown Soldier had not died in vain. That's why the Nisei is not giving up the fight, not lying down simply because of what Gen. Dewitt or John Lechner or U.S. Webb or Rep. Anderson may say. The stake at hand is much too great to be discouraged by the bigoted boos and taunts of a small hitleristic minority. For the Japanese American knows well that it is not merely their future welfare that is involved, but the honor and integrity of our Nation must be fully justified in the eyes of our Allies whose skins are not "white" and in the eyes of those oppressed people thruout the world whom we hope to deliver from the diabolic clutches of Axis theorists.

There is nothing to be ashamed of, in the eyes of our Lord and of our Constitution, because the wombs from which the Japanese Americans emerged unto a land synonymous with democracy happened to be alien. But to be accused of disloyalty, infidelity to the land where they first gasped for a lungful of pure

oxygen simply because of that racial strain is to mark the accusers as out-and-out saboteurs of our total war effort.

For Americanism is NOT a matter of race or ancestry. It is, as President Roosevelt said, more a matter of the mind and heart. And the heart and mind of the loyal American Japanese, like the heart and mind of this Nation, is brimming with a devout conviction that this earth shall ultimately be made safe for democracy, an "ism", that shall enunciate the fact that ALL MEN are created equal, that ALL MEN are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights.

Back in the year 1855, Mr. Lincoln wrote as follows to his long-time friend, Joshua F. Speed: "As a nation we began by declaring that, 'All men are created equal.' We now practically read it, 'All men are created equal, except negroes.' When the KNOW-NOTHING get control, it will read, 'All men are created equal, except negroes and foreigners and Catholics.' When it comes to this, I shall prefer emigrating to some country where THEY MAKE NO PRETENSE OF LOVING LIBERTY, -to Russia, for example, WHERE DESPOTISM CAN BE TAKEN PURE, AND WITHOUT THE BASE ALLOY OF HYPOCRISY."

You see, fellow-citizens, even Lincoln almost a century ago had to contend with the frantic bellowing of demagogic vultures who dare to play around frivolously and debasingly with the God-given rights of men, of ALL MEN. It is grievous, indeed a tragedy, that men such as Dewitt, Anderson, Hearst, et al, who are in responsible positions cannot perceive even the basic tenets of a democracy; men, who instead of prosecuting the war to a successful conclusion, are actually sabotaging the over-all, larger interests of their nation by espousing racial discrimination and prejudice.

Fellow American citizens, in keeping faith with your country, your posterity, with future generations, and with yourself, remember these Biblical passages when your thoughts dwell on race-baiting demagogues: Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely for the Lord hateth a lying tongue, a false witness that uttereth lies and he that soweth discord among brethren. Too, remember what Poor Richard sayeth: "The fool's heart is in his mouth, but the mouth of the wise man is in his heart." KO

NISEI ARTIST WINS PRIZE AT NAT'L ART EXHIBITION

Mine Okubo, gifted Nisei artist in Topaz, earned plaudits and an Artist Fund Prize for her two entries at the Art Association's recently held annual Exhibition of Drawings and Prints, according to a report in the California Arts and Architecture magazine (April issue).

Of 400 entries, 109 were placed on exhibit. Most of the show is devoted to the usual tenets, landscapes, observations and bits of American scene, it was reported. Miss Okubo's paintings, however, were called "notable exceptions."

Her prize-winning entry showed two sentries guarding a Japanese internment camp. Critics declared, "It is done as solidly as mural in black and white. The two soldiers with their guns on a hilltop make a bold and sharp design against the small bare barracks of the distant camp."

"Evacuees" in same medium and style "is a similarly muralesque treatment of Japanese family struggling with the problems of baggage and removal.

"Both of these drawings have a simple rich pattern of blacks and greys that is very fine," the critic observed in his favorable comment.
