

## C.E. OFFERED

### \$18,830 LOAN

George Kato, Community Enterprises manager, was offered the loan and use of the TCC I camouflage dividend fund check of \$18,838.68 on a temporary basis to cash the March advance payments made by check to Poston residents.

Seiichi Nomura and Franklyn Sugiyama, Council heads, made the offer. However, before the check can be used for that purpose, it is believed that the Council must approve the transfer first.

## WRA OFFICERS TO HANDLE JOB INQUIRIES

Residents with inquiries on job opportunities outside were advised today to send their questions to the relocation officers of WRA instead of the local offices of the United States Employment Service.

The WRA has been informed that evacuees were writing directly to the USES offices in various mid-western cities. The USES reported that it was not prepared at present to handle such inquiries in the local offices.

There is in process, however, a cooperative arrangement between the WRA and the USES where by the local office of the Service will refer interested employers directly to the relocation centers. Copies of the cooperative procedure will be sent to the Center within a week of two, the WRA stated.

# WAR DEPARTMENT LOWERS STANDARDS FOR VOLUNTEERS

The War Department advises that eye and ear standards of volunteers have been lowered, and all volunteers who did not pass previous eye and ear standards will be re-examined as soon as possible, according to a wire received yesterday from S. M. Rowalt, Deputy Director of the War Relocation Authority.

## PICKLE FACTORY TO BE BUILT BY INDUSTRY DEPT.

The Processed Foods Div. of the Dept. of Industries of Unit I, has begun construction of a Pickling Works for the manufacturing of pickled and preserved vegetables, it was disclosed.

With the Subsistence Dept. under C.E. Snelson supplying all necessary ingredients Poston-grown vegetables raised by the Agriculture Dept. will be processed by the Pickle Factory and distributed to the mess halls.

The Pickle Works will be erected in the Industrial District, just South of Camp and directly East of the Camouflage Net Factory.

The information, which was released to the press by Ralph M. Gelvin, Associate-Project Director, did not give additional facts regarding the procedure to be set up for the re-examinations. He stated, however, that the Phoenix Recruiting Office will probably release detailed instructions when ready.

It was believed here that the lowering of standards came because of protests of the Project Administration at the relatively high rejection made for minor defects.

No information was yet available as to the date for induction but volunteers were to be ready to leave soon.

# RESETTLEMENT DISCUSSED AT EDUCATIONAL FORUM FRIDAY

Fifteen appointed personnel members and interested residents of Poston Two participated in the first of a contemplated series of forums on topics affecting the project and its residents, Friday evening "under the stars" by the Block 210 Central School Library. The subject discussed Friday was "Will Resettlement Be Successful?"

Under the chairmanship of Administrator James D. Crawford, the participants discussed the aspects of the various implications of the relocation program. While no particular conclusions were reached, it was agreed by all present that a more extensive educational program should be launched among the evacuees and the general outside public.

It was felt that the evacuees should be educated on how to conduct themselves after departing from the center to gain the maximum of good will and thus pave the way for those to leave as well as to assure themselves of more pleasant living conditions.

The problem confronting the WRA in the way of public relations was also recognized as being of much importance in successfully carrying out the relocation program.

Goji Iwakiri, an evacuee resident who left the center last year for farm work and spent the year on the outside, related his experiences in Idaho. While the forum was originally held as a part of the Teachers' Easter Educational Conference, the interest aroused by the discussion was so intense, it was agreed that these seminars should be held regularly.

## GLEN FISHER ADDRESSES UNIT III PTA

Glen Fisher, representative from the Committee of American Principles and Fair Play was the principal speaker at the second session of the Educational Conference which was successfully concluded in Unit III Friday, April 23rd.

Glen Fisher, who spoke on "Relocation" declared that evacuation was unconstitutional, but stressed that citizenship will be vindicated.

"Although evacuation is against the Bill of Rights---in the heat of passion and excitement one does make mistakes," he pointed out. "Give America time to make amends."

"This is not only a war with guns, but of ideas," he further stated. "War of ideas is here on the home front. If we lose the battle of ideas, the battle of guns is of no use. Fight for ideas and democracy and mingle in the American life and ways," he urged.

Nell Findley of Unit I spoke on "Relocation or Resettlement and What it Means to Us". "Resettlement is not a thing to fear but to look forward to," she stated.
