

POSTON QUARANTINE STILL EFFECTIVE **C. E. TRUSTEE TO EXECUTE NEW DECLARATION**

In view of the prevalence of Poliyomyelitis on this project, it is advisable to continue the existing quarantine as regards travel to Parker, Phoenix and Gila Project. It is also advisable to extend this quarantine to people desiring to travel to and visit from other relocation projects. Exception can be made in the event of extreme emergencies.

FORMER POSTONIAN RETURNS LOST WALLET

Sachi Anraku, former resident of Poston who is now being employed by the WRA in Washington got her picture in the Washington Star and favorable publicity recently as a result of a good turn done a WAVE.

Miss Anraku found a wallet containing \$66 on a downtown Washington Street. After considerable difficulty she located the owner, Seaman Coraldine Sexton and returned the wallet to her refusing to accept a reward.

The Washington Star quoted Miss Anraku as saying that she had done "only what any other American would do in similar circumstances." The picture showed her returning the wallet to the WAVE.

Miss Anraku, who was given indefinite leave to accept a civil service position in Washington last March, is formerly from Los Angeles. The rest of her family is still residing at Poston.

NEW STORAGE RULING RECEIVED

Evacuee Property Officer, R. W. Schmitt states that he has received some recent rulings and amendments to the code governing storage and shipment of Evacuee property. These rulings are more favorable and liberal to the Evacuee and are designed to give more equal privileges to all evacuees with regard to storage and shipment of household goods.

Mr. Schmitt also states that his office staff are rapidly becoming more experienced in handling property problems which has resulted in being very helpful to many property owners from the restricted areas. If you have property problems needing attention, Mr. Schmitt assures us that they are well prepared by now to give them prompt consideration.

In an official statement released to the Press from W. Wade Head, project director, according to communication from the Solicitor's Office of the WRA advising that a referendum by the people of Poston on the proposal to transfer the present assets of the C.E. to the cooperative when incorporated would not, in fact, validate the transfer.

Therefore, it was stated by Mr. Head, no referendum will be held, but instead, the Trustees will execute a new declaration of trust with a provision that names the cooperative as the beneficiary of the trust. It was further disclosed that previous to the Communication, he was in favor of the referendum, but now in view of the new legal theory from the Solicitor's Office, he has advised the Co-operative Congress that a referendum is unnecessary, therefore, will not be held.

HEARST NEWSPAPER MEN ON ASSIGNMENT IN POSTON

The Colorado River War Relocation Center is due for a report from Hearst newspapers this Saturday, Sunday or Monday, following yesterday's visit in Unit I of an ace reporter and photographer from the Los Angeles Examiner, it was indicated. The two newspapermen were discovered in the center when they went to check in at the Administration building.

The reporter, James Lewis, and the photographer, Felix Peltret, were shown the warehouse while the normal amount of stock was on hand.

They disclosed that their article will be based on the relation between Parker and Poston, but they did not indicate what their approach would be.

On a number of occasions, it was observed, the Hearst newspapers have attacked the WRA and its policies.

POSTON NOW RECEIVES 5236 QUART OF MILK

Kitchens of Poston are now receiving 5236 quarts of fresh milk instead of 4700 quarts which they had been receiving, according to C. E. Snelson, Chief Steward. This new shipment of milk is being distributed to each block in proportion to the number of children they have. In case any block should have invalids, sick persons or expectant mothers, each block will have to donate one quart of milk.

Ice for the kitchens will be delivered as soon as the ice plant can supply Poston with the required amount. The public must bear in mind that the ice delivery will be made subject to the plant labor and transportation situation.

Shipment of fresh vegetables will be received twice a week instead of once a week.

The cooks are requested to take care of the Lund Automatic can openers that had been issued as they are impossible to replace.
