

RADIOS MAY BE RELEASED FROM STORAGE

Radios that are not short waves or with short wave parts removed, deposited with the San Diego, Brawley, Watsonville and Salinas police stations may be released by requesting the U.S. Attorneys offices at Los Angeles or San Francisco, according to the district.

There is also a possibility that radios with short wave may be released in care of the Project Director, who will assume the responsibility of having the short wave parts removed by the Project radio technicians.

Forms for requesting the release of radios are now obtainable at the Evacuee Property Office in Camp 1, Legal Office, Camp 2 and at Camp 3 Administrators Office.

CONTRABANDS STILL BANNED

Due to misunderstandings regarding the releases of contraband goods, Ralph M. Gelvin, Associate Project Director, stated that the following articles are still contraband here under Proclamation No. 3 of General Dewitt dated March 24, 1942.

Firearms, weapons of war, ammunitions, explosives, shortwave radios and transmitting sets, signal devices, codes, cameras and papers or books containing invisible writings, photographs, sketches, drawings, etc. of any military or naval post, camp or station or matter to aid the enemy.

EMPLOYMENT CHIEF LAUDS PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY

Complete endorsement of the public opinion survey on resettlement being conducted by the Poston Opinion Research Center was made today by Giles L. Zimmerman, Chief of the Employment Division.

"This Poll is one of the most important methods by which we here on the Project and officials of the WRA in Washington can regulate

and guide our relocation program," Zimmerman stated. "The answers will be used to assist us in meeting the needs of the people in Poston.

"Such surveys have been conducted at other centers, and have proved highly valuable to the relocation program and the people of the Project.

"We are very fortunate to have the services of Iwao Ishino and Toshio Yatsushiro of the Research Center, who have received special training at Denver to conduct public opinion surveys. Their training will assure the effectiveness of the poll," Zimmerman said.

CLARIFICATION OF CLOTHING CASH REVEALED

Due to some misunderstanding in regards to the Clothing Allowance eligibility, a clarification statement from Hitoshige Okabe, Supervisor of the Clothing Allowance Dept., reports:

1. Any person who has worked at least 15 days out of the month
2. Wives and children of men who are eligible
3. Any person who is eligible for unemployment compensation
4. Any dependents of Camouflage workers. (Workers must work at least 15 days out of the month)
5. Any dependents of Community Enterprise workers. (Workers must work at least 15 days out of the month).

Also any person who does not come under any of the above classifications, but needs financial assistance may make an application for the same to the Public Assistance Division of the Family Welfare Dept.

POSTON STUDENTS AT CAMP SAVAGE "DOING WELL"

Poston students at the language school in Camp Savage are doing excellent work, Lieutenant-Colonel Gould reported yesterday. Here to recruit more students for the new class, he said he is hoping that some six or seven will sign up.

DRIVERS URGED TO COMPLY WITH ODT LAWS

Residents of Poston are once more requested to assist in securing compliance with wartime equipment restrictions according to a statement to the Chronicle from F.M. Haverland, Supply and Transportation officer.

Mr. Haverland stated that it has been noted that considerable use of vehicles for unofficial purpose is still prevalent. Individuals who are driving the equipments should be careful to eliminate unnecessary mileage and anyone seeing equipment being used violating the ODT regulations, should take it upon themselves to point out such misuse to the drivers.

"Unless our equipment is conserved to the utmost," stated Mr. Haverland, "we shall soon be faced with insurmountable supply and transportation problems."

ENGLISH-JAPANESE DICTIONARY SOLD

The Adult Education Department regretfully announces they have received word from the Harvard Press that the Fuzambo's English-Japanese Dictionaries are now temporary out of print. No English-Japanese Dictionaries will be forthcoming till the first of June.

COOPERATION URGED FOR MEDICAL STAFF

As a result of a mass appeal meeting held last week, a hospital committee was formed with representatives of Units I, II and III. In conference with the hospital staff these points were brought out:

- (1) More than anything else it is the lack of cooperation, good will, and appreciation that make the medical staff want to leave.
- (2) In the near future home-calls will be eliminated except in special cases. Instead patients will be taken to hospital by ambulance during hours of 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- (3) A program to educate the people on public health will be started.
- (4) Sufficient nurses' aides must be recruited for new class to start July 1. The nurses' aides in Poston receive the best training of any hospital in the country, and
- (5) Everything possible must be done to make the life of the hospital staff comfortable. This can be done with thorough cooperation with the hospital.

The possibility of a school day terminating at 12 noon or else six periods in the morning and the shortening of the school year were discussed.

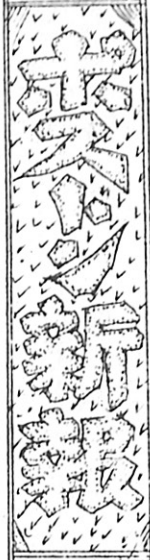
