A DOCTOR-LESS POSTON?

DEAR EDITOR:

I doubt very much the wisdom of reprinting in your columns letters from hysterical people that appear in the Los Angeles Times. Several considerations are advanced in support of this opinion.

1. It is known that usually it is the disturbed person who writes letters to the press. By recognizing these anti-Japanese letters, you might create the impression that all persons in Los Angeles are hostile and prejudiced toward our American Japanese. We know this is not true.

2. There is a danger that you may stir up among the people here the same sort of hysterical prejudice against the people of Los Angeles that the writers of these letters manifest toward you. And two wrongs don't make a right.

3. A subtle suggestion of race prejudice on your part may be noted in your "Lampoon" section of May 6, where you refer to one writer as a "Jew." What difference does it make if he is a Jew? The significant question is: What is he saying? What are the possible consequences of his ideas?

Personally, I have been questioning the wisdom of confining your newspaper reading here to the Los Angeles papers. There are newspapers in the country that are trying to deal with the so-called American Japanese situation fairly. Why not include these papers among those available at our canteens?

Many of the doctors have very attractive offers from the best hospitals in the country. Thus far they have remained because of their wonderful spirit of self-sacrifice that we in Poston be provided with the best of medical care.

Speaking with the doctors, we hear it is not only because of the "material ends" of life that the doctors want to leave. We find that more than that, it is the lack of goodwill, the lack of cooperation and the lack of appreciation which so disgusts the doctors. Many of the residents act as though the doctors were on civilian pay subject to the slightest whim or criticism. They don't realize that they too are like us--forced to evacuate because of our blood. They don't realize that they too are paid only \$19.00 a month for 10-15 hours of work.

After conferences with the medical staff, we hear that if the residents show more appreciation, cooperation and goodwill, there is a good possibility most of the medical staff will remain. If this be true, we here in Poston are most fortunate. We have very little to offer them in material ways. Our only means is fortunately the easiest. Let us all show our appreciation, cooperation and goodwill in concrete ways: Don't complain if service be a little late, be appreciative and thankful that we here in Poston are able to have a medical staff who think more of the People than themselves. Goodwill, appreciation and cooperation must be our key words to a happy Poston!
