

UNIT II NET FACTORY CLOSÉS

Production of nets in the camouflage sheds in Units I and II ceased last Wednesday due to the lack of raw nets. Production manager Walt Bilicke, stated yesterday.

Bilicke declared that although negotiations for more raw nets have been going on, no assurance had been received that a shipment was forthcoming. The management stated that at present there were no hints to determine whether the shut-down would be permanent or temporary.

Unit III weavers will continue work until their supply of 36x44 and 45x45 nets is exhausted.

RED CROSS TO DISTRIBUTE FIRST AID KITS

The Poston American Red Cross today disclosed the arrival of WRA First Aid Kits, to be distributed, two to each block, within the three camps.

However, because of the small size, the Red Cross announced they will provide in addition: numerous other medical supplies for the blocks, as their contribution in building up the First Aid Kits.

Blocks were advised in a memo today to report to their local Red Cross offices to receive the supplies. The containers were submitted recently by each block, at the request of the Offices.

JOBS WITH ARMY INSTALLATIONS OPEN TO NISEI

EVACUEES WORKING ON HOURLY BASIS

A revised procedure for payment of cash advance to evacuee employees has been in effect since May 1, according to Administrative Instruction No. 23 issued by Project Director W. Wade Head.

Starting the first of this month, evacuee employees will be based on the basis of actual hours he has worked rather than on basis of a 30 day month. The standard hour provided are 8 hours, per day, 5 days each week and 4 hours on Sat.

The hourly rate of pay varies with number of working day per month and schedule will be provided monthly by Time Keeping Unit. Fractional hours less than half will not be counted.

Sufficient time will be allowed for acquiring cash advances or clothing allowances. Workers are thus advised to adhere strictly to this rule, in order to be assured of their working wages.

DR CARY RELEASES GRADUATION DATES

The date of the graduation exercises for the Poston high schools have been released by Dr. Miles E. Cary, Director of Education.

The schedule for the three units are as follows: Poston II, June 24 and Units I and III, June 30.

Under the new Army regulations, which became effective May 3, positions and jobs with Army installations are open to Japanese American citizens, who have been cleared as to their loyalty, in all locations, except the prohibited areas of the Western Defense Command according to Colonel William P. Scobey, General Staff Executive.

During the past, it was not possible for the Japanese Americans to be employed on the Engineer job in connection with the camouflage factory. But since the regulations have now been revised, the Engineers Department may employ Japanese Americans in various jobs, such as truck drivers, etc., for the camouflage factory.

This further restoration of rights to Japanese Americans should show conclusive proof, that we have friends who are working for our interest and security.

RATION BOARD STATES SIDE TRIPS BANNED

Evacuees and Caucasians leaving the project with their automobiles are requested by the Poston Branch Ration Board to take direct route to point of destination. Sufficient gasoline has been allotted or rationed to those individuals leaving the Center, but however, to curb unnecessary traveling by taking indirect route, as visiting trips, must be curbed.

BOARD TO DRAFT WORKERS PLANNED

To meet any emergency manpower shortage which invariably will arise with the acceleration of the WRA Relocation Program, a block committee of 4 to 6 members elected within the blocks, will serve as a board to draft people into various essential departments such as kitchen, warehouse, fire dept. etc., it was decided at a weekly meeting of the Block Managers of Unit III.

Plans to place the Block Manager's staff in the C category by eliminating the block custodian was also discussed. Under this plan the secretaries, janitors and the block gardeners will receive \$19.00 a month.

No private vehicles will be permitted to be held within the block, it was announced. Henceforth, Block Managers are instructed to report all automobile to the office of Mr. Burge, who will give instructions for the storage. These vehicles are in reference to private cars that are being brought in by the evacuees planning to relocate.

In a memo from the Sanitation Department to the Block Managers, it was stated that the improper disposal of excess waters from the apartment coolers created an unsanitary condition causing breeding places for mosquitos. Also foundations may be weakened by allowing such conditions to exist. Drainage pits filled with gravel was suggested.

New block managers introduced at the meeting included Jim Nishimins, 309; George Furuta, 317; S. Fujimoto, 330; and I. Harada, 316.
