Writer Points to Facade to Unity: Sees Hope in Pro- Allied Group

The presence in Japan of a definite pro-Ally and liberal sentiment among a majority of the people, even after the 1939 outbreak of World War II, comes to light in an exceptionally brilliant study of the Japanese by a man who taught them for nearly four years. . . .

Majority opinion among students in the First High School, the Third Middle School, and the Junior High and a few private classes, which provides a reasonably comprehensive cross-section view of the nation, was skeptical of Mr. Harris and expected her ultimate victory. Mr. Harris learned: In my evening classes attended mostly by young men and women from the other (lower) end of the social, educational and military hierarchy was much more outspoken, and democratic, not to say communistic, sentiments were openly expressed—though sometimes with a quick turn of the head to see that no policeman was within earshot. As for my Japanese colleagues, in all my military schools, they were strong, friendly and sympathetic in their attitude, and in the privacy of my own quarters would pour out their feelings in a frank and unreserved manner. . . .

Mr. Harris traces the trend toward liberalism until the Army prohibited the formation of the "Federation" in July of 1937 when the military had occasion to "rearrange" the composition of the committee. . . .

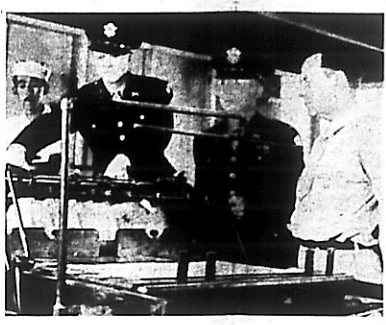
W. Wade Head Urges Cooperation Against Center Fire Hazards

Brethren Hostel Takes 2 Weekly From Poston

Under a new program announced yesterday by Dr. Vadiman, a minimum of two people, a man and a woman, will leave Poston every week for the Brethren Church's hostel in Chicago. Of 150 accommodations to date, 33 have been from Poston.

Mr. Smeltzer, director of the hostel, reports that jobs are easy to find, and an excee spends an average of six days at the hostel. "It often takes a few days longer to find exactly what a person skilled excee can find employment, if he has training in some particular line of work. An unmet immediately in work paying from 50 to 50 cents per hour plus time and a half for overtime. Skilled men can earn 75 cents an hour. Many secretarial and other office work paying \$90 to \$135 per month are obtainable."

DEFENSE INDUSTRIES OPEN TO NISEI

Poster Carrying Executive Order Says Race, Origin Not Grounds For Discrimination In War Effort

Project Director W. Wade Head announced today President Roosevelt's reaffirmation of the order on fair employment in war industries. Executive Order 8802 states: "I hereby reaffirm the policy of the United States

that there shall be no discrimination in the employment of workers in defense industries of the government because of race, creed, color, or national origin, and I do hereby order that it is the duty of employers and of labor organization, in furtherance of said policy and of the order, to provide for the full and equitable participation of all workers in war industries, without discrimination because of race, creed, color, or national origin."

Dr. Cary Bares Plans For Summer

During this session in between the third and fourth quarters of the school year, the two main problems to be solved are the matters of coolers and files.

In a memo of April 1 to Mr. Parkhill, Associate Engineer, Mr. Dr. Cary, the following reasons were given for seeking a government contract to purchase coolers for the schools. . . .

The black widow spider may be identified by a red hour-glass on the abdomen. The body is glossy black—the over-all length of the female being about 1 1/2 inches. The female deposits her eggs in a sac, each sac containing from 25 to 900 eggs. In warm weather it takes 20 days for the eggs to hatch. The female likes dark, corner locations as a place to spin her web. Indoors she likes the cellar, garage, hen house or outdoor toilets. Outdoors she hides under stones or boxes, in long grass, in hollow stumps or in old stone or lumber

plies. Wherever trash is allowed to collect, there she may be found. When the females has found a suitable place to establish her web she spends the rest of her life, guarding her eggs and feeding on moths, crickets, flies and other insects that may disturb her web. After mating she often attacks the male and kills him by sucking his body fluids. Hence the name "black widow". The cure for the black widow is poisonous, causing swelling and intense local pain. The spot should be treated with an antiseptic such as tincture of iodine, and a doctor should be consulted immediately. Soaking the parts in very hot water will relieve the pain. To get rid of the spider, clean out the webs in closets, under tables and benches and other dark recesses with the end of a broom.

Recent reports from relocated evacuees and Caucasian friends on the "outside" relates of disparaging conditions wrought solely by unthinking Nisei. Among the thoughtless deeds reportedly being committed by the resettled Japanese Americans are: (1) tendency to walk the city streets and stand around street corners in conspicuous groups; (2) usage of the Japanese language in public; and (3) dressing in sloppy, dirty, unbecoming clothes while in town.

Outgoing evacuees should keep in mind that much of this success (or failure) of the entire relocation program rests on their own shoulders. Public sentiment, while favorable in most instances (read of the Rockies), is not yet sufficiently crystallized to condone the unnecessarily conspicuous appearance of any person of Japanese stock. Any untoward incident involving an American Japanese may seriously deter the success of resettlement plans and disadvantageously affect the future welfare of the Japanese in the U. S. A.

The essential business of educating the general public towards accepting the loyal Americans of Japanese descent as a part and parcel of American life is difficult enough as it is. Why discredit and hamper needlessly their efforts by acting imprudently? For it is by committing such carelessness that the Nisei discredit themselves and "cut their own throats", not to mention the welfare of fellow evacuees still incarcerated in the relocation centers. It is to be hoped that more attention will be paid to these matters of conduct by evacuees already relocated and by those who are yet to leave their respective centers.
