

LUMBER BEING TAKEN BY EVACUEES

A grave situation has arisen lately with the evacuees taking lumber and other material for personal use without obtaining proper authorization, according to a memo received by the TCC from Dr. Miles E. Cary, Director of Education.

It is felt by the Director of Education, that the action of these adults will hurt the characters of the children, if this condition continues. Furthermore, most of the appointed personnel are going to form a distorted opinion regarding the Japanese American, as a result of this behavior.

Residents are asked to cooperate by refraining from appropriating lumber and other materials without proper authorization.

OUTSIDE JOBS POSTED AT MGR'S OFFICE

Evacuees interested in obtaining outside employment were advised to form a daily habit of perusing the bulletin issued by the Outside Employment Department and posted by the block managers in their respective blocks.

Currently, the job offers coming in from many regional relocation offices located throughout the country have been more promising. Letters from former Postonians already resettled all seem to indicate that public sentiment, despite the news story of the TCC executions of American flyers, is still favorable.

In applying for jobs listed on the bulletin, applicants are requested to refer the jobs by code numbers.

7,000 EXPECTED TO VOTE TODAY ON NEW CONSTITUTION

With approximately 7,000 from a possible 10,000 eligible voters expected to go to the polls today for the Poston wide election on the acceptance of the New Constitution, several sources have expressed their confidence for its acceptance by a comfortable margin.

SPECIAL PASSES REQUIRED VEHICLES AFTER HOURS

not accepted, the present TCC is expected to resign. A new Charter would have to be drawn up, as it is mandatory under WRA instruction number 34, issued in August 1942, for every Project Director to call on an organization body to plan and devise a Charter for each relocation center, which must be approved by Washington, and then submitted for popular acceptance.

Under the New Constitution, the present temporary form of self government will be abolished, and replaced by a permanent form. However, the proposed permanent form would seem similar to the present self government, as no new powers are granted the Council, but the advantage is that the three units of Poston will operate under a single central legislative body, to be known as the Poston Community Council.

Poston Community Council will consist of 19 members, nine members representing Unit 1 and five members each from Unit 2 and 3. Those members are to be elected by the Local Council of each unit.

Issai will be eligible for elective offices in community according to the latest WRA instructions. This liberalization of policy will broaden representation, and should mean the placing of responsibility for stable government on all residents and not merely on the Nisei.

For many residents of Unit I, this month of May is probably replete with reminiscences. For it was approximately a year ago this month that the first group of venturesome evacuees made their tired and dusty way into Poston.

Undoubtedly much of the experiences undergone by those pioneers were not pleasant. Poston, then, was truly barren and desolate as compared to the community of today. The task at hand, at the time, of building a "civilization" worthy of human beings was nothing to sniff at. It required all the resourcefulness and courage at their command. Hope and charity, faith and defeatism, births and deaths, snakes and scorpions, physical and mental labor, dust, heat and perspiration, and perseverance are among the ingredients indelibly imprinted into the saga of the birth of a war-time community, Poston.

It is to the credit of a great majority of those first arrivals in immediately taking up the pencil and hoe, hammer and typewriter, pots and pans, and the trucks and tools and thus making the initial contribution towards the foundation for the Poston of today. True, Poston is far from being what one might consider an ideal community. But it could be much worse.

As our pioneer residents turn their recollective thoughts to those days gone by, it is the hope that they will realize that their many heart-and-back-breaking endeavors have not been in vain. It is also the hope for those who then "knew not where to go from here" that they have regained their perspective and look to the future with humility and strength, with renewed faith and hope in their America. Remember, God moves in mysterious ways his wonders to perform. But you must have faith.

WATCH YOUR STEP

It cannot be stressed too often, in the face of many false accusations concerning the Americanism of evacuees, of the necessity for careful conduct by those many Postonians who are being channeled into the normal streams of American life in their actions and habits on the "outside". One incident unfavorably involving a person of Japanese descent will react to the detriment of thousands of others.

It is a great responsibility

Poston residents will be called upon today to approve or reject an over-all constitution which was drafted after many months' work by the foremost legal and political brains of our community. Acceptance of the charter by the majority will mean that Poston will henceforth be governed by one body, similar (with all due respect) to the Congress of the United States. The "local" councils of each of the three Units comprising Poston proper may similarly be compared to the State Legislatures.

Approval of the newly-drafted legislative structure would seem to indicate a progressive step for Postonians. One of the many weaknesses extant in Poston to date has been the lack of sufficient coordination between the governing bodies of the three Units. If the residents should see fit to approve the constitution today, much of misunderstandings should be obliterated.

But regardless of whether the residents are for or against this constitution, every eligible individual should exercise his franchise. And no one should TELL another person HOW to vote. Advices are okay. But in the final analysis, every eligible voter should feel free to cast his ballot as his conscience dictates.

THINK OF YOUR NEXT COUNCILMAN

While on the subject of the constitution, it may well be wise for the residents to start mooting as to who their next council representative should be. In many cases, the present council of at least one of the Units has been found to be very much wanting in more capable and qualified delegates.

The councilmanic post should be looked upon with respect, as their actions will reflect the thinking of an entire community. With the approach of an election for "permanent" councils, it is imperative that every eligible resident give this matter more thought and place only men (or women) of the highest integrity and character into office.

ART EXHIBIT ATTRACTS LARGE CROWD SUNDAY

Under the auspices of the Plastic Art Dept. and Social Activities of Poston I, a gigantic exhibit was held at Blocks 32 and 17, Sun. Exhibits displayed included the finest craftmanship and skill, demonstrating the artistic taste of the evacuees.

The outstanding exhibits were wood carving, iron wood craft and cut stone display. Among the many displays, miniature wood carving and label pins acclaimed much credit by individual presentations. Stone display at Rec. 32 drew much attention which consisted out stones from all parts of the world in addition to the local stones which were cut and polished by the lapidary industry here. Among the practical craft displays, mandolin case constructed from mesquite trees glued piece by piece, forming a perfect workmanship; "shogi" board and checkers made from iron-wood, with the checker container constructed from mesquite trees, glued individually to form a rectangular box.

Approximately 5500 residents walked through the display rooms during the one day exhibit.

ARMY RESERVES INTERVIEWED

Acting on orders from the War Department, Captain Holmes and his staff called in all the Army reserves for interviews, Friday.

SURVEY OF COOLERS MADE

The result of a cooler survey, made by the block managers, as of May 4th, show out of a possible 1008 apartments, 587 of them had coolers of one type or another in use in the 16 blocks for an average of 37 to a block.

MOVEMENTS OF GOVERNMENT VEHICLES RESTRICTED

Restrictions upon the operation of all government automotive equipment were put into effect Saturday, May 15, by the order of the Colorado River War Relocation Project, Division of Internal Security.

Operation of police truck shall be restricted to the limits of the community to which they are assigned. In cases of absolute emergency, trucks may be driven from one community to another, but in those cases, a report must be submitted within 24 hours to the office of the Chief of Internal Security or the Unit Administrator of the community to which the trucks assigned. If such permission has been granted, it will not be necessary to make a written report of the emergency run.

Police officers are henceforth authorized to stop any government automobile or truck after 6:30 p.m. week days, 12:00 noon Saturdays or all day Sundays and demand that the driver produce a written permit for the operation of the vehicle during the prohibited time. Should the driver be unable to produce this permit the vehicle shall be immediately taken away from him and shall be turned into their respective motor pool.

List of vehicles authorized to operate during the prohibited hours are now posted in the police dept.
