

TWO WARDS, MESS HALL ARE OPENED TODAY,
IN NEW POSTON GENERAL HOSPITAL

Two wards and a mess hall of the Poston General Hospital will receive patients today, according to Dr. Leo Schnurr, Director of Health and Sanitation. The wards are located on the north and south side of the mess hall. The opening of the 250-bed hospital has been made possible through the fine cooperation of the U.S. Army Engineers and the Del Webb Construction Company.

With an enrollment of 21 students, a training school has been organized for the education of young Poston women as ward attendants and nurse aides.

Plans are being made, according to Dr. Schnurr, for official sanction of an organized training school for nurses. A census of the city shows that among the evacuees, there are a large number of undergraduate nurses whose education was interrupted by evacuation.

Miss Elizabeth Vickers is in charge of the student training school. Following a period in which she served as Director of the Nurse School and Nursing Service at Greenville, S.C., Miss Vickers more recently completed her work for an advanced degree at Columbia University.

LATH HOUSE IS PLANNED
FOR GUAYULE PROJECT

2000 Seedlings Arrive Here From
Salinas; Vegetable Tract Is
Subjugated

Construction of a lath house, approximately 120'x60', to care for 2000 guayule seedlings will start soon according to H.A. Mathiesen, Director for Agriculture and Industry at Poston.

The seedlings were shipped here from Salinas, Calif. through the courtesy of Dr. Robert Emerson. They are already bedded in. A pound of guayule seed has already arrived. It is expected that 24 acres of guayule will be seeded by January 1st, 1943.

Meantime, thirty acres of land have been leveled, and a temporary centrifugal pump installed for the seeding of the vegetable garden. This is located adjacent to Block 6.

According to Mr. Mathiesen, one-third of Poston's block areas has been bordered and leveled for irrigation. Many areas

throughout the city are already being planted. One resident already has in flats, young tomato plants for 13 acres. It is believed that most of the citizens will plant vegetable gardens between apartment buildings and blocks.

According to Roy Kobayashi, acting chief of the Poultry division, arrangements are being made for an 80-acre chicken ranch. The large mosquito trees will be left on the site. Plans and specifications have been completed for all structures. Additional farm projects which have now passed the blue-print stage and are well on their way toward fulfillment are:

A swine and hog ranch, and a fish pond.
