

## PROJECT EMPLOYMENT STUDIED BY WRA OFFICIAL

Dr. Mary H.S. Hayes, employment officer from the Washington WRA office, is in the Center this week studying project employment.

Dr. Hayes, formerly chief of the employment division of the National Youth Administration, expects to stay in Poston for about three weeks. At present she is making a survey of the number of workers in the Project

The purpose of the study, she stated, was to make a comparative analysis of the number and types of jobs in the relocation centers. She has already made similar studies in Rohwer, Granada, and Jerome.

The interest of WRA in project employment in no way shifts the emphasis from resettlement, it was stated. "It is felt in Washington," Dr. Hayes declared, "that relocation is the most important question, and that now is the psychological time to take advantage of opportunities."

## LEAVING JOBS MAY HINDER RELOCATION

Chicago Relocation Supervisor Elmer L. Shirrell today decried the fact that a number of evacuees have accepted employment of various kinds only to leave the project and quit such employment almost immediately or, in some instances, have not reported on the job at all. He stated that employers are becoming increasingly critical of such practices and advised that continuance of such will do great harm to the relocation program.

Shirrell emphasized that the efforts of the relocation field offices will be concentrated on good placement and suitable employment opportunities for evacuees referred to the WRA.

## RE-EXAMINATION REQUIRED FOR DIET PERMIT

It has been noticed that a number of persons who have been issued diet permits as long as six months ago have been trying to secure special food at their respective mess halls although they are not qualified for the special foods.

In order to discontinue such practice, all diet permits issued by Ida G. Rees, Field Nutritionist, are void unless they are marked "duration", stated Miss Rees.

Miss Rees stated that if the permit held by the patient does not state "duration" on it, they are requested to be re-examined at the hospital to determine whether a diet is needed or not.

The above statement does not apply to pregnant women, nursing mothers or infants and children. This group should receive certain foods for normal nutrition.

## MATSUMOTO TO HEAD SALONS

New uniform prices for the Beauty Shops of the three units, effective June 1, have been released by the Community Enterprises, according to George Kubo, C. E. Manager, the new prices are up very little from the previous prices.

Naotichi Matsumoto, former proprietor of the Angel Beauty Shop of Los Angeles has been appointed to supervise the salon of the three units. Reorganization and remodeling of the salons are expected, especially in Unit I, Mr. Kubo stated.

The new prices list released by the C. E. ranges from 10¢ for comb outs, thinning, neck trims and permanent wave per block to \$1.50 for plain machine permanent and \$2.25 for machineless permanent. It is requested that all patrons bring their own linen, pins and curlers.

## STUDENTS TO GET SWIMMING INSTRUCTIONS

Six junior high school home rooms in Poston I will receive swimming instructions through the Physical Education Program commencing this week according to the high school office.

A signed slip from the parents of each student will be required before he will be allowed to enter the pool under the supervision of two Red Cross instructors and two P. E. instructors.

The classes to receive swimming instructions are: 7th grade--25-B, 26-B and 11-B and 8th grade--39-A, 22-C, and 26-A.
