

MERCHANT MARINE POSITIONS OPEN FOR EVACUEES

Tata Kushida, head of Outside employment, yesterday requested former employees of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad to call at the Project Office of the Outside Employment Department for information concerning the status of their return to service with the railway.

Kushida also indicated that a copy of a letter from Paul S. Higa, corresponding secretary of the Japanese-American Maritime Worker's Committee, stating that it is now possible for experienced evacuee seamen to obtain employment with the Merchant Marine, is available for perusal at the Outside Employment Office.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO AID SCHOOL COMPLETION

In order to utilize every available manpower in Unit I to rush the completion of the school project at least before the next semester, Dr. Harris, Director of Secondary School and the Labor Relation Board agreed upon an emergency plan.

It calls for all available high school students, who are sixteen years of age and over, to volunteer for the school construction on Saturdays from eight A.M. to twelve noon, starting June 5.

Under this Plan, students from one block are only required to work for one Saturday, since students from other blocks will volunteer on successive Saturdays. The block managers have been notified the dates for each block's turn to go.

COMMUNITY COUNCILMEN INSTALLED BY GELVIN

"Marking another milestone in the making of a better community", according to words of Ralph Gelvin, Acting Project Director, the Boston Community Council convened for its initial meeting in Mess

Hall 32, June 1. Thomas Masuda, attorney, acting as chairman pro-tempo in place of Project Attorney Haas' absence, introduced Gelvin who administered the Oath to the councilmen. Unfortunately, the administration of Oath and the meeting was delayed by the absence of one member, Ray Ono of Unit I, who did not attend.

RANCH HAND JOBS OPEN IN NEBRASKA

Recruiting will begin tomorrow, June 4, for 30 to 50 farm hands to work on a ranch in Cozad, Neb., the Employment Division advised today.

The contract stipulates that workers will be paid \$75 per month plus maintenance for 7 days' work per week, 10 hours per day. Work on Sunday will be paid at double time rate, making it possible for the worker to earn \$14 in excess of \$75 per month.

Duties will consist of caring for livestock, feeding sheep, putting up hay, and everything necessary in production of agricultural products, such as, corn, sugar beets, carrots, onions, etc.

Akira Misawa of the Employment Division will supply further details and take applications in the unit employment offices, beginning tomorrow. He will be at the Unit 2 office tomorrow morning, at Unit 3 in the afternoon, and at the Unit 1 office on Saturday morning.

It was pointed out that workers will be released on indefinite instead of seasonal leaves,

Nakamura of Block 17 was elected temporary chairman, with Sakamoto as temporary vice-chairman. It was decided only to elect a temporary chairman and vice-chairman, since the councilmen from the three units were not acquainted with each other. The temporary Chairman is to preside for two regular meetings, after which a permanent chairman is to be elected.

Gelvin disclosed that a food requisition for \$11,350,000 for all relocation centers have been sent in, which approximately amounts to 31 cents per person per day. However, the centers are expected to produce an amount of \$5,000,000 in vegetables, meat, and other products.

Masuda stated that the Community Council is to function under the Project Director or the Project Attorney, and the Local Council to work under the Unit Administrator.

The Community Council decided to meet twice a month, first and third Thursday afternoons at one thirty, and to hold the next two meetings in Unit I.

2,236 CHICKEN DELIVERED MESS

Total mortality for the project is 2,354 chicks, which consisted of Rhode Island Reds and White Leghorns, leaving the balance of 12,700 chicks on hand.
