POSTON POST OFFICE MAIL  
PEAK HITS NEW HIGH  
SAYS SUPERVISOR

Full Truck Load Now Dispatched  
Each Day From City To  
Parker Railhead

The Poston Post Office is now handling 2,300 outgoing and 2,000 incoming pieces of mail daily besides a full truckload of packages, according to Paul Farmer, Supervisor of the Post Office. Mail should be in the main Post Office by 3:30 so that it can be dispatched by 4 for Parker. The mail arrives at 9 and the boys start to deliver them at 1, to the various Block Managers' offices.

After July 1st, Earlon Gardner will become the Superintendent of the Post Office. Mr. Farmer will be assigned to another new evacuation city located at Rivers, Arizona to develop the Post Office. There are now four employees at the Poston Post Office.
