

N. Y. A. TRAINING AGREEMENT FOR RELOCATION CENTER'S YOUTHS WITHDRAWN RECENTLY

Research Bureau Survey of English - Speaking Residents Reveals 63 Percent to Leave Center

Efforts Being Made For Substitute Offers, Myer

66 Percent to Leave Within Six Months

The sluce leading from Poston to the mainstreet of American life is widening. Now on, with a few exceptions, the speed of resettlement depends on the willingness of evacuees to go out, which in turn is contingent to some extent on the quality of the job offers submitted by the WRA field men. As far as the English-speaking residents are concerned, most of them want to get out—quick.

A recent survey conducted by the Bureau of Sociological Research disclosed that 63 per cent of the people interviewed were expected to leave Poston. Of this, 66 per cent planned to leave within six months; 35 per cent, within two months. The results were based on the answers of 300 evacuees, representing a cross-section of English-speaking population in Poston.

The latest step toward accelerating relocation was the announcement recently that evacuees may leave for certain areas without a job offer. It invited by the area relocation officer. This is to enable the prospective employer and the prospective employee to meet and increase the chances for quicker and better placement.

From the beginning of the evacuation program, we have recognized the need for temporary residences where the evacuees would stay until arrangements could be made for their permanent relocation in accordance with a carefully prepared plan designed to accomplish two primary results: (1) The relocation of persons of Japanese ancestry from throughout the United States under circumstances that will enable them to become integral parts of the communities into which they go, with the least possible disturbance; and (2) The delayed relocation—with residence continuing in the relocation centers in the meantime—of those evacuees whose individual records indicate that our war program would be endangered unnecessarily if they were to be relocated at the present time. We believe that the latter group will be a relatively small one and that it is safe to attempt to relocate the great majority of the evacuees before the war is over.

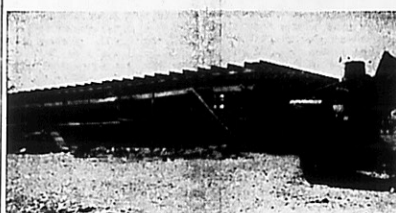
- (1) Registered for leave clearance in March during the mass registration.
- (2) Answered question 28 with an unqualified affirmative.
- (3) Has not applied for re-employment or expatriation.
- (4) Is not a paroled alien.
- (5) Is not a Shinto priest.
- (6) Has received neither suspension nor denial of leave application.
- (7) Does not propose to be employed or reside within the Eastern Defense Command.

Of course, if he had an invitation from a hotel or a relocation officer, he doesn't need a job offer before applying for indefinite leave.

The processing is relatively simple: Joe goes to his unit leave office with his birth certificate, if he has one and files his application for indefinite leave at the same time he applies for travel allowance and financial grant. His leave application is forwarded to the project leave office, where it is meant to see that Joe doesn't fall into any of the restricted categories and to make certain that his project record is clear. When a decision is rendered, and Joe is okay, he is notified by his unit leave office. The unit office gives him three sheets of paper which instruct him to return to his unit timekeeping office, his

Popkins Reveals Center Figures For Operation School Construction To Be Completed By Fall Semester

Despite the prevailing adverse conditions the school construction is progressing rapidly, through the cooperation of the evacuee workers according to Charles Popkins, construction engineer. Currently the building is being constructed by the evacuees with the assistance of two Caucasian workers. The thirteen structures which will be occupied by the elementary school is expected to be completed by September. The buildings are constructed on modern and simple design in order to use the evacuee

workers in construction, with adobe as exterior material. It was further disclosed that 60% of the work has been done by the women, which is a sure sign of progress. The Construction Department disclosed other operations which have been performed by the department in addition to the school construction. The department revealed the re-construction of seventy-two mess halls, laying of 2,250,000 square feet of master tape, construction of 250,000 square feet of partitions for the barracks.

Lamar Merchants Complain Lack of Evacuee Business

A very surprising fact concerning conditions existing between the Granada Relocation Center and the neighboring town of Lamar was recently disclosed by a merchant. A number of retail merchants in Lamar have been complaining because more evacuees are not permitted to shop in the town. Although a certain number of evacuees are allowed to go to Lamar each day, the number has been decreased greatly within the last few months. Some of the merchants getting through the retail division of the Chamber of Commerce have decided that better results could be obtained by writing to the Colorado senators and representatives. Why not give us a trial? There's nothing to lose but everything to gain.

The National Youth Administration, through its Director, Aubrey Williams, has withdrawn from its agreement to accept WRA Project youth for training, it was announced by Dr. Joseph Samler, WRA head of vocational retraining. The announcement coincided with the critical stage in budget hearings on NYA, but it was not explained whether the proposal would be reopened if NYA's budget worked out satisfactorily.

Dillon Myer, WRA Director, reached by telephone Tuesday, said every effort is being made to provide substitute opportunities for the NYA applicants. The Vocational Retraining Committee of the War Relocation Authority is working on a Government-sponsored course in Mechanical Drafting next month, and is urging extension of out-of-center training opportunities for all age groups, it was explained here.

Evacuee Property Service Require W. R. A. Forms

Provisions Made For Expectant Mothers and Children

In order for a resident of Poston to take advantage of the free services provided by the Evacuee Property Office, it will be necessary for him to fill out and sign a request form. This form supplied by WRA will contain the information necessary for the field supervisors to carry out the desires of the owner in the statement will be a general description of the property, its location, present condition, if any and other facts affecting it. Where the property is affected by leases, contracts, agreements, inventories or other lists of goods, copies should be furnished to the Evacuee Property Office.

Special efforts have been made to insure the health and the nursing mothers and their infants and children with extra food, as milk, eggs, etc. to meet their daily requirements. In the line of foods for infants and children, enough of the following items to last three months: Gerbers and Clapp's Strained Foods, Milk, Babium, and Cod-Liver Oil. Just now, we are receiving a sufficient quantity of eggs and citrus fruit and tomatoes to meet the daily requirements. Should a shortage of the last two named develop during the summer months, we will be able to meet the emergency immediately, for we have in stock an ample supply of crystalline vitamin C. The raw milk shortage will doubtless become acute before the end of the summer. For this reason, the mothers are urged to teach their children to drink irradiated evaporated milk. Ordinary evaporated milk is as nutritious as raw milk, due to its vitamin D content, is more nutritious than raw milk which is not irradiated. There can be no reasonable excuse for excluding milk from a child's diet so long as canned milk is available.

If it develops that officials of the Evacuee Property Office cannot fully carry out the expressed desires of the owner, but counter offers are received, they will be fully reported and may be accepted or rejected by the evacuee.

At this point, I want to call the attention of the mothers to the fact that food, in itself cannot solve all health and growth problems. For instance, often here children are not allowed to remain at the table for a long enough time to permit them to relax and have time to eat a sufficient amount of food. Too, these hot days, a child needs from nine to twelve hours of sleep.

IRRITATING EFFECT OF PUNISHMENT LESSEN TO NISEI

The continual disparagement and castigation of the American Japanese by certain elements of the United States, notably by factions representing the West Coast, is no longer as irritating as it used to be.

We were, and still are, we had fun trying to figure out how we were supposed to bid-Culbertson would have had a "fit." I'm sure, he had witnessed our crude attempt).

SOMEDAY, SOMEWHERE WE'LL MEET

Yes, they were wonderful folks. And once again, we are to feel the pangs of parting. But it's a small world, as it has so often been said before, and it would not be in the realm of far-fetched imagination to acknowledge the fact that some day, somewhere we may cross each other's tracks again.

I don't doubt that most of you have experienced the same feelings. It's tough, in a way, to see your close friends leave, especially at a time when true and tried friends are more or less at a premium. One by one they are dropping away from our closets and hot work-a-day existence. We can only hope that they will all get their just rewards and make

give due credit to our way of life, to our educational system, by refusing to differentiate between those Japanese in this country and those in Japan. They will, for some ulterior motive, continue to endeavor to mislead the public as to loyalty of the Nisei toward America, continue to attempt to lead the impressionable and relocation center in an internment camp.

He seemed to have been wakened from a deep sleep and really, he acted that way. Queer old fellow! And then slowly he turned and started to walk toward the Block X and I, being a lone busy walker, I fell in with him, the while, my mind was quite busy trying to find any possible and reasonable connection be-

tween the sunset and the American flag. You were very curious why I was looking up at the flag a while back," he commented.
