

## NEW HOSTEL SERVICE OPEN

Residents desiring invitations to the new Mutual Service Center hostel in Chicago may secure application forms from Edith Tashashi at the Relocation Office, the Employment Division announced yesterday.

The forms, after they are filled out by applicants, will be submitted to the Chicago office of WRA where they will be reviewed. Invitations will be dependent upon the chances for employment in Chicago for the individual.

Charges at the hostel are about \$2 per person per week for a room. Although there is no dining hall at the hostel, many reasonably priced restaurants are located in the immediate vicinity, according to information received here.

## FOUR LEAVE VIOLATORS RETURNED TO POSTON FROM DENVER

Increasing importance of evacuees' action while on leave was illustrated by the arrest and return of four Poston youths to the Project Monday, escorted by a WRA official. The youths, three from Camp 3 and one from Camp 1, were taken in to custody from their hotel rooms in Denver by two detectives because they had left Weld County without written permission from the appropriate WRA officials as prescribed by their leave permits.

When arrested, they had been in town for six days, coming there to look for another job following their release from their sugar beet contract in Weld County. They were taken to jail, but were released when Erv S. Wingren, deputy district U. S. Attorney, said that no federal charges would be filed.

In accordance with established national regulations, however, the WRA had to cancel their leaves and return them to the Project, escorted by Arthur G. Morgan, relocation officer in the Denver area.

## EVACUEE EMPLOYMENT TO BE DRASTICALLY REDUCED

Words received from Dillon S. Myer, following a memorandum of May 11, a forthcoming Administrative Instruction on Project Employment, establishing employment quota for each project on the basis of maximum number of employees necessary to perform essential tasks, will be effective July 1, for the purpose of particularly emphasize the importance of efficient work and maintaining good work habits. Investigations also indicated that the Colorado

Relocation Center's maximum for ordinary Project operations including subsistence, production, and Community Enterprises will be approximately 5600 employees with an addition of 15% allowed to meet emergency needs.

Not more than 10% of employees may be classified supervisory or professional at \$19, with the Project Director's discretion, the same rate may be paid to employees performing unusually hard or disagreeable tasks up to 5% of total pay roll.

Budget allocations will be made accordingly to this policy assuming that (1) efficient management and (2) that every employer will work full eight hour day with same standards of efficiency as prevail in private employment.

Three months have been allowed to the Project Director beginning July 1 to come within the quotas.

Allocations of the first quarter funds will contemplate after achieving the one-third of the necessary reduction of the forces by July 31 and the quota limit by September.

## WIRE REVEALS INTERNEES IN SANTE FE SAFE

In a wire received from the Santa Fe Internment camp in New Mexico by the Council Chairman, in regards to the fire that destroyed three buildings last week, Chikuro Kondo, a spokesman for the internees stated in the message, "Everybody alright here, please advise Units 2 and 3."

Commenting on the incident, Gilos L. Zimmerman, Chief of the Employment Division, declared, "This indicates the serious effect that such a violation has on the entire relocation program and other young men interested in taking jobs. Since this story was featured in the Denver Post, accompanied by the picture of the four youths, serious harm has been done to the creation of favorable public opinion in the Denver area.

"It is important," Zimmerman added, "that all persons departing from the Project realize that their action reflects not only upon themselves but also upon all evacuees."

## LAST MINUTE GIFT CAUSES INCONVENIENCE

In view of crowded conditions on trains, W. Allen Gushman, official escort, suggested today that residents do not wait until the last minute when giving gifts to departing evacuees.

**POSTON I ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AUDITORIUM  
DEDICATED YESTERDAY BY PROJECT DIRECTOR**

**STOLEN RAILS CAUSE  
HAZARD FOR PASSENGERS**

Cornerstone dedication ceremony was held yesterday, June 29, at the elementary school grounds in Unit I with Project Director W. Wade Head, officially dedicating the huge auditorium which will be completed this summer.

The cornerstone inscribed "Built by the Japanese residents of Poston" was placed at the southwest corner of the 50' x 100' auditorium, which will seat approximately 600 students. This building is the smaller of the two to be constructed, the other being the high school auditorium to be built in the near future which will be 60' x 120' and seat 1200 pupils.

"This cornerstone represents all of the school buildings and not this building alone," stated Mr. Head in placing the stone. "30 or 40 years from now your children may be using this building as many of you might stay in this valley, so consider these as yours," Mr. Head continued.

During the ceremony, while Mr. Head was pouring the mortar, an audience yelled joyfully, "a 16 dollar brick layer." Mr. Head answered, "I used to belong to the C. I. O. before John L. Lewis did."

Dr. Miles E. Cary, Director of Education, the other speaker of the day in his "one hour and half" address stated: "these new buildings are a symbol of a new community life --- teachers, texts and school supplies provide the centers are a sign that the government are interested in the education of evacuee children..... teachers' salaries here a better than those on the outside so they are attracted to Poston."

In closing, Dr. Cary told the audience to have faith in the schools of Poston.

The program ended with Miss Breeze turning the 5 sixth grade classes over to Dr. Harris, Poston One High School.

## MYER ORDERS CUT OF PROJECT EMPLOYEES

Administrator Burge in a long expected statement to the block managers Tuesday morning, told the gathering, of an order received from pillon S. Myer, National WRA Director, that the project employment must be cut to a point of the essential operation of the project.

At the present time, Administrator Burge stated, there are over 8000 employees in the project and the order from Director Myer will make it necessary to cut this down to 5600, the maximum number allowed this project. Budget allocations will be made accordingly and the project will be allowed 3 months in which to make this change. The changes will be made gradually so that no department will be put to any unnecessary hardship. This change is necessary due to the cut in appropriation made in the congress.

Out of the 5,600 employees, only 10% or 560, will be allowed the supervisor's or \$19 rating. The project director, however will be allowed to make a special rating for 50% of the total or 280 extra workers who may have unusually hard work.

A meeting of all members of the Manpower Commissions and Merit Rating Board and the Administrators of the 3 units were called Tuesday afternoon by Director Head to work out a plan.
