NEW COUNCILMEN SWORN IN AT UNIT ONE

Additional new members of the Unit I Local Council were officially sworn into office by Len Nelson, Unit Administrator, during the weekly Local Council meeting, held July 7. They were Yamada of Block 2, Murakami of Block 44, Sasaki of Block 19, Yamamoto of Block 11, Shigemura of Block 39, and Kushiyama of Block 14.

Several changes in personnel were made by Chairman S. Nomura for the various Unit I Council committees. Sasaki replaced Inagaki of Block 19, who resigned from the Council, on the Agriculture and Industry committee. Yamamoto was added to the Community Activities Committee, Kushiyama to the Labor Relation, and Shigemura to the Housing.

The appointment of K. Matsumoto, Nagai, and F. Kawai to the Executive Board by Mas Kawashima, chairman of the Board, was approved by the council.

PLANNING BOARD DESIGNATES REC AND AG AREAS

The Planning Board of the Unit II Community Council reached decisions at their meeting Thursday morning regarding the development of the agricultural and recreational areas on the various points within the unit.

Areas marked Agriculture will be the lands surrounding the camp, east and north of blocks 201 and 202, firebreak between 212, between 215, 216 and the administration blocks. Firebreak areas 223 and 225 are to be plan-

ARIZONA BUSINESS LAW INVALID

JUDGE PHELP DECLARES UNCONSTITUTIONAL

The law passed recently by the 16th legislature prohibiting business transactions with Japanese and other persons whose movements are restricted without publication of notice was held Tuesday by Superior Judge M. T. Phelps to be unconstitutional, according to the Phoenix Gazette release.

Judge Phelps made the holding in the suit of Tsutomu Ikeda, Mesa, against Johnson-Pearce Commercial Company of that city, in which he denied a motion of the attorney general's office to dismiss the complaint.

Later the court also quashed informations filed against several business concerns and individuals on charges of employing or doing business with Japanese whose movements are restricted without publishing notice.

Ikeda, American citizen of Japanese ancestry and Mesa district truck farmer, filed the suit attacking the constitutionality of the new Arizona law.

Alfred C. Lockwood, attorney for Ikeda, countered with contentions the new measure violated state and federal constitutions in that it denied him privileges granted other

ted soon, it was, revealed.

citizens upon the same terms, deprived him of property without due process of law and denied him equal protection of the law.

Among other things Judge Phelps pointed out that the language of the law is ambiguous, indefinite, uncertain violates provisions of the constitution.

In calling attention to the manner in which the measure works, he declared members of the United States armed forces would be restricted and that a Chinese would have to give publication of notice to bury his dead under the provisions of this statute.

After Judge Phelps made his ruling in the civil action of Ikeda, J. V. McCrory, chief criminal deputy county attorney, accepted the contentions of the attorney general as applicable to the criminal cases, and the court promptly quashed the informations.

In his civil action against Johnson-Pearce Commercial Company, Ikeda set forth he had been engaged in truck farming near Mesa for many years and had purchased a considerable portion of his supplies from the company which he asserted would continue business with him were it not for the law.

He also alleged the company agreed May 18 to sell him 20 pounds of turnip seed for planting on his farm and nine days later refused to fill the order on account of the state.
