

AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION FERTHS EVACUATION WORST INVASION

The wholesale evacuation of more than 70,000 American citizens of Japanese ancestry and their subsequent confinement in what are "virtually concentration camps" was the worst single invasion of citizens' liberties under way pressure" in the past year, according to the annual report of the American Civil Liberties Union issued this week under the title of "Freedom in Wartime."

In reviewing the state of civil liberties, the Union reports that "our democracy can fight even the greatest of all wars and still maintain the essentials of liberty." Among the exceptions to this, the Japanese-American issue is listed first. The ACLU reports a continuous agitation against evacuees in the forms of local resistance to resettlement of individuals and families, bills in legislatures and case in the courts.

"Considering the speed with which 115,000 people, over 70,000 were American citizens, were moved from their homes and occupations," the ACLU reports, "the military authorities did an extraordinary job with a minimum of complaint. But the fundamental discrimination based on race marked the entire process and inspired a continuous agitation not only in the Pacific Coast states but throughout the country."

The situation has been somewhat relieved, the reports shows, by permitting loyal Japanese-Americans to leave relocation centers and

GOV. WARREN SIGNS AMENDMENT TO LAND LAW

Project Attorney T. H. Haas, summarized some of the important provisions of the new law which amends the Alien Land Law. Governor Warren of California signed the Senate Bill 10, on June 3 which became Chapter 1059, Laws of California, 1943, stating:

It is unlawful for any alien appointed as guardian of his native born minor child to operate or manage any land in the guardianship estate, except solely for the use and benefit of a minor or to receive the beneficial use of the land or any proceeds therefrom directly or indirectly.

The annual report showing in detail receipts and disbursements, must be served by the guardian on the

District Attorney of the county, who shall receive notice of a hearing of said report. Any person signing a lease or other agreement involving an interest in real estate with knowledge that an alien guardian will receive the beneficial use of the land or proceeds therefrom is guilty of violating the statute.

The Attorney General or the District Attorney of the proper county may institute injunction proceedings to restrain any person from operating a farm in violation of this statute. They may also institute proceedings to test by declaratory action whether or not any agricultural land is being farmed or used under a contract in violation of the statute.

Violations of any of the provisions are punishable by a maximum of ten years imprisonment and the payment of \$5,000 fine.

Negotiations are in progress at the present which may result in the transformation of the late Nishi Honganji Temple on North Central Avenue in Los Angeles into a municipal recreation center for the children of war workers, it was reported at the Play-ground and Recreation Commission meeting held recently in Los Angeles. Police Captain Joseph Reed, who was present at the meeting, described a heavy influx of negro families from the rural areas of the southern states, now crowded into the formerly occupied by Japanese, creating housing and health problems and traffic hazards.

He also stated that hundreds of children cause they have no other place to go and recreation center for them is urgently needed.

having formerly lived in the West Coast areas of which were evacuated of Japanese ancestry. From various Relocation Camps they have answered the call to military duty enthusiastically not only to contribute to winning the war but also to aid in establishing beyond all doubt the loyalty of Japanese Americans to the land of their birth."

COMMUNITY COUNCIL OF UNIT III ISSUES RESOLUTION

The Unit III Community Council issued a resolution to H. A. Mathiesen, Chief of Industry and Agriculture. The resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS, upon the request of the residents of Poston III, the Local Council has appointed a committee to inquire and investigate the functions, operations, and management of Industry and Manufacturing from the beginning of its operation in Poston III; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Local Council of Poston III, unanimously feel satisfied that the findings of the Investigating Committee of said body are reasonable and factual, and

WHEREAS, the body feels that it is within its jurisdiction to recommend a resolution such as this one under Administrative Instruction #34, and

WHEREAS, this body understands the WRA instructions governing the operations and regulations of the organizations such as Industry and Manufacturing of Poston III (WRA Administrative Instruction #44 Revised), and

WHEREAS, the matter in regards to the investigation of Industry and Manufacturing has taken up considerable amount of time of all parties concerned, and furthermore, it is the desire of this body to have this matter come to a speedy and satisfactory termination, and

WHEREAS, it is not the desire now the intent of this body to press charges or start prosecution, and

WHEREAS, upon recommendation of the committee the Council has arrived at the conclusion that the Community Enterprises is a more appropriate organization to engage in purchasing and selling of the merchandise to the residents within the center, and

WHEREAS, the WRA Administrative Instruction #44 (Revised) clearly states "the purpose of Industry is to initiate and to put into operation useful employment in order to reduce the operation expenses of the center,"

BE IT SO RESOLVED that effective immediately, the organization of the said Industry and Manufacturing be limited to merely manufacturing and processing of the goods only; that it refrain entirely from any kind of purchasing and selling of goods processed, raw, semi-processed or whatever the stage of processing the goods may be classified; that it refrain entirely from purchasing and selling of material, merchandise and, or articles of goods in any manner; that the Community Enterprises be the sole organization within the center to furnish raw materials for manufacturing and processing by the Industry and Manufacturing, and that the said Community Enterprises be the sole organization authorized to sell and dispose of the merchandises thus manufactured and processed by the Industry and Manufacturing, and procurement of merchandise, equipment, tools, supplies and other such goods heretofore furnished through the WRA procurement be continued in same manner and the Tofu and Moyashi Manufacturing of Poston III continue to be operated on the manner as previously done.
