WRA ANNOUNCES 3600 NEW EVACUEES WILL ARRIVE IN POSTON STARTING JUNE 28

Thirty-six hundred new evacuees are expected to arrive in Poston starting next Sunday, June 28, at the rate of 500 new citizens a day, according to an announcement from the WRA Administrative Staff today. Including four arrivals yesterday from New Mexico, the total population of the city is now 7,775. Most of the evacuees arriving here starting next Sunday will come from Salinas, California.
