CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS TO BE HELD AUG. 21

First Civil Service examination on the Project for nisei with clerical, typing and stenographic abilities will be held on August 21, it was announced yesterday.

To be eligible for the examination candidates must have received leave clearance from Washington, and must file their applications on standard form 57 at the unit employment offices no later than noon, August 14. The forms are available at the unit offices.

It was emphasized that applications must be notarized before filing. People on the Project authorized to certify applications are Kay Hamada, Dorothy Stevlok, Charles Smith and Edward Nossoff.

Qualified applicants will be notified later of the exact time and place of examination.

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NAMES OF SEGREGATION BOARD OF REVIEW NAMED

W. Wade Head, project director, yesterday announced the names of the members of the Poston staff who will serve on the segregation board of review. This board is provided for in the administrative instructions for carrying into effect the segregation program. The members are: Ralph Gelvin, Ted Haas, Len

Nelson, Jim Crawford, Moris Burge, Giles Zimmerman, Ernest Miller and John Powell.

This board will interview all the people who gave qualified answers to question 28 at the time of the registration or for some other reason may be among those considered for the Tule Lake Center. This board will not meet as a body on all cases but rather in groups of two or more for the purpose of conducting interviews.

The objective of the interviews is to ascertain the honest feeling of the person and whether they are loyal to the United States and want to be Americans, or whether they prefer to be among those to be segregated.

The segregation board of review is not to be confused with the board of review for leave clearance. They are entirely separate and concerned with different objectives.

522ND UNIT TO ENTERTAIN GIRLS

Camp Shelby, Miss.-- The 522nd Field Artillery unit of the Combat Team will be hosts to 100 young ladies from the Rowher and Jerome relocation centers in Arkansas August 7 and 8, according to Lt. Paul Brandeis, special services officer.

Feature of the ball in honor of the visitors will be the debut of the All-Combat Team orchestra under the direction of Sgt. John Yamamoto.

With the expediting of the relocation program the evacuee property office is contemplating upon an increase in the transactions during the next few months, which simultaneously means more rapid and simplified methods must be taken to meet the influx. Therefore, the department has released a supplement to instruction #78.

The new supplement allows free transportation of the evacuee's household and personal effects, provided that initial transportation expenses have been carried by the evacuees. This disregards the 500 pound limit. This free transportation applies to goods shipped into the Center without the request of the evacuees but by the various organizations which are assisting the evacuees.

It is urged by the office that if you are entitled to more than 500 pounds free transportation, file your applications immediately at the office, prior to relocation.

These nationals will stay in their respective centers until the exchange.

A CHALLENGE

Two changes are distinctly noticeable in the philosophical attitude of the people of Poston toward any act not morally right; and the present attitude of the people is manifested first, in the "hush-hush" technique and second, in the rationalization technique, which give at best a most ambiguous or obviously stultified reason; and at worst, anything but the real reason for condoning a breach of social and moral ethics.

"We want to avoid a scandal." "Nihonjin do shi dakara; this is among us Japanese, so-----" "Let well enough alone." "Let sleeping dogs lie." These are some of the murmurings we hear going on. "Oh, well, this is Poston what do you expect?" ---a vicarious expression of self-pity, one of the most demoralizing agents of self-destruction to impoverish the character of Man. But the facts are these: There need be no room for self-pity in the minds of strong men and strong women; self-pity must be defenestrated from our body of emotional experiences.

However, there is no gain saying the fact that the moral fiber of the Japanese in Poston has weakened; and the people, through their "hush-hush" and rationalization techniques, are disgracing themselves and humiliating not only themselves, but also the ones who have been stupid enough to be apprehended; for even fools can feel ashamed to live among bigger fools!

By closing their eyes to what is going on about them, the people are only hurting themselves and making the Japanese to be objects of silent ridicule and contempt by decent members of the appointed personnel, who cannot, in honesty, speak well for the Japanese when they are questioned critically by the Caucasians on the outside. And by suffering fools --- social and moral evasue Quislings, who would "sell us out" --- to "pull Brodies" and not be called to account for the inestimable damage they do to the community and to themselves, the people are clamoring to have opened to them the gates of promiscuous immorality, which is bound to find echoing repercussions in the social and moral conduct of the younger people in Poston. The psychic effect is long-lasting and injurious to the people, reminding them that they did not do what social and moral duty called them to do.

The moral fiber of the Japanese has weakened! It has weakened just at the time when not dissolution, but rejuvenation of the moral fiber should be the order and the cry of the day.

This is not an accusation to you, or to myself. It is a challenge to every sober-minded, right-thinking citizen to contribute toward the strengthening of the moral fiber of the community; and to rectify the sad degeneration he has been permitting to go on uncensured, by forcing to the bar of moral justice all those who would shirk their duty to themselves, to their "loved" (?) ones, and to their community, whose welfare is closely tied up with their own.
