The text of Mr. Head's letter to the chairman of the Poston Community Council fol-

lows:

"It is my desire to have the evacuees part icipate to the fullest extent in the handling of the segregation program in Poston: I am, therefore, most anxious to have a body representing the residents to work closely with the Administration in all phases of this pro gram:

"I, therefore, am re questing that the Community Council appoint a committee representing the entire project who will act as consultant and advisor on segregation. It is my suggestion that from three to five members be appointed from each unit and that these members include representatives of such organizations as Parent Teschers Association and women's clubs.

"As you know, the work on segregation has already started: and I would appreciate your taking action on this rutter as soon as action on possible, so that may have the benefit of such a committee in the early stages of the program."
