1500 ACRES TO BE UNDER CULTIVATION

Posten has been producing a great deal more food than many of the people here realised, it was indicated by a report from the Agricultural Deps. Because some of the farm land is located at a distance from the center, people do not have the opportunity to see the progress that has been made.

Meanwhile the work of getting more land ready for irrigation and cultivation goes ahead. By the first of October it is hoped that there will be ready for use some 1500 acres. The present acresge of land in truck crop production is about 228 acres and 70 acres of field crops.

A total of 627 tons of segetables were produced in Poston for the past four month period, according to the report of the agricultural department. In addition the poultry project delivered for use on the project 10,659 pounds of chicken fryers, and the hog project provided 12,922 pounds of pork. There were also 1184 pounds of edible pork products in addition to the meat delivered to the project mass division.

In the industries di emphasis vision more was placed on the pro-duction of food and less on the production of other articles. Somo of the other articles were removed from the For production list. the four months period of April; May and Ju-tofu, moyashi, mi-so and miscellaneous food production from the industries division amounted to 142,757 pounds.

Recruitment of nisei women for the WACs will begin in Poston next Thursday with the arrival of Lt. Roberta L. House, assistant district recruiting of ficer, to interview prospective candidates, it was announced tody.

It was announced Lt. House will conduct interviews in U-nit 3 on Thursday, Unit 2 on Friday, and Unit 1 on Saturday.

Initial recruitment will be for 250 nisei women throughout the country, in ol ud ing those outside the relocation centers as well as in.

Since the Lieuters syisit here last March, physical requirements for the WACs have been lowered. The age limit now is from 20 to 50, the minimum height and weight are 57 inches and 95 pounds respectively.

Women interested in enlisting may leave their names at their unit administrator's office.

In the meantime the Welfare Department has started interviews with persons who have been recommended to go to Tule Lake and members of their families. This is to determine what other members of the families will go to Tule Lake center and to see that the best arrangements are made for those who do not go.

It was emphasized again that people having notices to come to the Welfare office for these interviews ar-range to keep the specified time on the notice and to have all members of the family present over 14 years of age. This is portant so that imall members of the family can take part discussions.

Announcement will be made soon about special interviews and arrange ments to be made for people who require medical care, or special services enroute to the Tule Lake center. Plans for hendling baggage and freight are being worked out and will be announced shortly.
