

MARCANTONIO BILL SUPPORTED BY POSTON

Interest in the progress of the campaign around the Marcantonio Bill H. R. 2011, which would amend the U. S. Naturalization Laws so that Orientals can become naturalized citizens, among the Japanese Americans, both issei and nisei is growing every day. The Community Councils of Gila River and Poston have requested several hundred petition blanks so that the feeling of the people in their centers may be fully expressed to the Congress, according to the Japanese American Committee for Democracy release.

There has been a warm response to the Bill from the American people, and the American Committee for the Protection of the Foreign Born announced, The Greater Detroit and Wayne County CIO Industrial Union Council spoke through its president, C. Pat Quinn, in the name of 400,000 organized workers, and telegrams were sent to all Michigan Senators and Congressmen urging their support for the Bill. Other groups such as the Club Obrero Espanol and the Sons and Daughters of Lithuania Aid Society organizations of loyal Americans of various national origin are wholeheartedly giving their support.

NO TULE EVACUEES TO COME TO POSTON CENTER

Poston, Manzanar and Gila will not receive any of the people who are to be moved from Tule Lake under the program outlined for segregation. This fact has caused some comment among residents here and has even led some people to think that these three relocation centers would be discontinued.

The reasons no people from Tule Lake will be sent to these three centers are very simple. It is mainly because Manzanar is within the restricted zone and the two Arizona centers are so near the border. It is also felt that many of the people who are moved

from Tule Lake will later want to relocate on the outside and that they will be closer to places where the job offers originate if they are living at some of the centers farther east or north.

This does not mean that all of the people who are moved from Tule Lake will relocate, or that they will not remain in the centers to which they are moved. A number of them who want to relocate will probably arrange to take jobs and go direct from Tule Lake to their places of employment rather than to move twice.

Another reason why Poston and Gila were not scheduled to receive any of these people from Tule Lake was because of the travel restrictions within Arizona.

WAC ENLISTMENT STARTS TODAY

Enlistment of the Nisei girls for the WACs began today in Unit 3 administrator's office with Lt. Roberta L. House.

She will remain in the Center until Sunday, interviewing prospective candidates in Unit 2 Friday in Crawford's Off. and Unit 1 Saturday, Gelvin's Off.

When contacted last week, Lt. House reported that the initial recruitment will be for 250 nisei girls from, the entire country, instead of 500 as originally announced.

Volunteers will be called within two or three weeks after Sept. 1, and would probably be inducted in Phoenix, Lt. House stated.

Rank and pay in the WACs is the same as in the regular Army it was pointed out.

UNIT III TEACHERS ATTENDING SESSION

A large number of school teachers, Caucasian and evacuees of the Unit 3 staff, are receiving their preliminary training at the Summer Session that is being held at Unit I daily in preparation for the opening of the fall school term.

To the present date, four new Caucasian teachers have been added to the staff and, more is expected to arrive soon. They are Vernon Olson, Mildred Standing, Phyllis Taylor and Barbara Washler.

212 Relaveled

Relaveling of the 212 firebreak has begun again to facilitate the irrigation of the field. A cover crop of sudan grass will probably be planted after the work has been completed.

POSTON II COMMUNITY ENTERPRISES GIVE CLARIFICATION ON CHARGES

In a report before the Unit Two Cooperative Council, Mr. Tazawa and Rev. Mitani of the Community Enterprises explained the findings of former councilman R a y Ono's investigation of the C. E.

While not flatly denying the charges, Tazawa satisfactorily explained the charges to the councilmen.

Through, Rev. Mitani admitted he was given \$250, and \$5 a day expenses for a tour of the other relocation centers, he said the trip was to look into the Community Enterprises of the sister relocation centers with an eye to improving our own C. E.

The money was used for no other purpose than for traveling expenses.

Bonuses to workers were denied. Tazawa said the receipts seen by Ono were for released workers who failed to get one week's termination notices so were given advanced pay and clothing allowance.

Tazawa admitted that watermelons were sold at higher prices at the canteen, but that this was necessary due to spoilage and breakage.

The variance in market price and elevating prices were responsible by watermelons being bought at slightly higher prices than quoted market prices.

Mr. G. S. Sakamoto, chairman of the Co-op Congress stated that those who wish to express their grievances regarding C. E. may come in to see him as all will be done for the benefit of the people of the community.

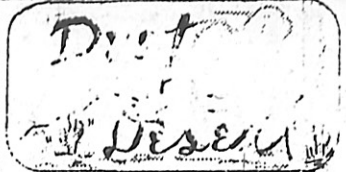
