HEALTH DEPT. URGES PROTECTION AGAINST DISEASE

In order to protect school children against epidemics, mothers are advised by Miss Elma Rood, Supervisor of Public Health Nursing, to observe their children carefully before sending them to school in the morning.

Any child with a headache, red throat, running nose, upset stomach or signs of a fever should be kept at home and in bed until well. A child who has been absent 3 days should report with his parents to the health department in Ward 7 at 8 am. If he is found to be free from any signs of illness; the child will be given a readmittance slip to return to school.

If the parents will help in carrying out these regulations, "Catching diseases" will be kept down to a low point in Poston schools, Miss Rood stated.

All children should be completing all immunity treatments at the present time, she stated.

OVERSEAS GIFTS DEADLINE OCT. 15

Christmas packages that are to be sent to servicemen overseas should be sent by September 15 and not later than October 15, according to Earlon Gardner, Postmaster.

All packages must not be over five pounds, 36 inches in length and girth combined, must not be sealed and should be wrapped with strong paper and tied with twine. Perishable matter will not be accepted.

Intoxicants and inflammable matter such as matches and fluids are prohibited, stated Mr. Gardner.

As a result newspaper stories, many offers have come to the WRA relocation office from companies engaged in making materials vital to the war effort. "We can place more than 100 men in skilled and unskilled jobs at prices ranging from 69¢ to \$1.10 an hour," Patterson said.

It was emphasized, however, that a person intending to relocate in Philadelphia must first have Eastern Defense clearance. Residents interested in entering the Eastern area may find out whether they have been cleared by contacting the unit employment offices.

CERTIFICATES TO BE ISSUED

The Camp III Public Health Office at 310-3. A will issue Certificates of immunization to all children three years and under who have completed the required number of inoculations against small pox, diphtheria, whooping cough, and typhoid fever.

Children between 3 and 12 years are required to have only three of the four immunizations to receive this certificate, that for whooping cough not being compulsory.

Those children who have not completed the necessary immunization will be notified to take them at the Public Health Office. Monday mornings have been set aside for typhoid inoculations; Thursday mornings, for small pox and whooping cough; and Friday mornings, for diphtheria.
