

## SAME TREATMENT GIVEN SEGREGANTS BY ENTERPRISES

Roy Tazawa, chairman of Board of Trustees of Poston Community Enterprise in the letter to Otto Rossman, Business Enterprise Section, New York City, in regard to the conclusion reached in matter of C.E. and evacuees who are going to Tule Lake states as follows:

1. Basically, we must treat every member of our Co-op organization fairly and equally. Since we are permitted to pay out cash for 25% of the total patronage dividend at present, the people who are going to Tule Lake should also be paid 25% just as the other members. The balance of 75% will be given to them in a credit certificate form.

2. Paying out the total dividend in cash to Tule Lake bound people does not necessarily help Tule Lake Co-op, because they might use up the cash and may not reach Tule Lake Co-op. But if we give them the credit certificates which can be redeemed through Tule Lake Co-op, it will certainly help. Poston Co-op will pay Tule Lake in a lump sum when we are permitted to pay the balance of the rebates, so that they can pay out the cash to the former Poston members.

If all the other centers adopt similar methods, we feel quite certain that it will actually help Tule Lake Co-op in a substantial way.

We communicate this to you in hope that some such scheme may be worked out.

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## ARTICLES DECLARED CONTRABAND AT TULE

People who will go to the Tule Lake center from here were advised to be careful about taking articles with them or having shipped to them, things which may be contraband.

The Western Defense Command is making up a new contraband list to apply to the Tule Lake center. While no proclamation has yet been issued to put it into effect, the items have been listed as follows: Firearms, weapons or devices ordinarily capable of such use, or implements of war or component parts thereof, ammunition, bombs, explosives or component parts thereof, shortwave radio receiving sets having a frequency of 1,759 kilocycles or greater or

of 540 kilocycles or less, radio transmitting sets, signal devices, codes or cyphers, and cameras.

Papers, documents or books in which there may be invisible writings, photographs, pictures, drawings, sketches, maps or graphical representations of any military or naval installations, or equipment or of any arms, ammunition, implements of war, device or thing used or intended to be used in the combat equipment of the land or naval forces of the United States or of any military or naval post, camp or station.

Flashlights larger than two cell and all flashlights regardless of size if equipped with colored lens or bulb.

This list may be extended to include any article designated by the commander of the Western Defense Command or the WRA, according to a statement which has been issued by the Project Director's office.

## SEGREGANTS URGED TO TAKE WARM CLOTHING

People who will go to Tule Lake center should plan to wear or have packed in the 50 pounds of checkable luggage at least one outfit of warm clothing. They will find the weather much cooler at the Tule Lake center than they have been accustomed to here at Poston. Sweaters which can be carried would probably be helpful, it was indicated.

By the first part of October frost is not unlikely at Tule Lake.

## INVESTIGATION URGED RELOCATORS FOR UTAH

Evacuees who are going out for employment into the Pacific Inter-Mountain area should give careful thought and consideration to permanent relocation, keeping in mind the conditions that will probably prevail after the war, as this area is believed near the saturation point, according to a release from H. Rex Lee, Relocation Supervisor in Salt Lake City.

At the present time, there are about 6,500 evacuees from relocation centers, plus several thousand established Japanese residents located in this area. Although employment opportunities are best in Salt Lake City, Ogden, and Provo, Utah, Pocatello and Boise, Idaho; and Spokane, Washington; it should be remembered that these are all war-boom communities and present numerous obstacles to newcomers.

In normal times, the Pacific Inter-Mountain area had a surplus of labor and when the war ends, thousands of war workers will be looking

Haas, Project Attorney. It was also stated that the Unit 1 staff would take over the legal problems arising in Unit 2 since mass segregation would leave less than 3,000 evacuees in Unit 2.

Over eight months ago the Law Division of Unit 2 was composed of two lawyers, one law clerk, and one secretary all who have now

for new jobs others discharged from the Army will be competing for available peacetime jobs and under such circumstances, Americans of Japanese ancestry may find rather difficult conditions.

Public sentiment is favorable towards evacuees, particularly in seasonal agricultural pursuits and in the service trades as the Japanese workers have saved thousands of acres of important crops and in most instances have left an excellent impression on those with whom they came in contact.

It was also disclosed that there is little question that opportunities for permanent resettlement are better farther east.

## JOB PROSPECTS GOOD IN EAST

Prospects for successful relocation for persons of Japanese ancestry in the Washington, D. C., Virginia, Maryland and Delaware areas are very encouraging, reports Robert Dolins, Relocation Officer in that area. Job and work opportunities are reported in practically every occupational field and evacuees find friendly reception in this area.

Delaware is predominantly agricultural with a heavy production of truck crops, poultry, fruit and dairy products. In Maryland, Baltimore is the largest industrial city with shipyards and aircraft plants, manufacturing of iron and steel products, chemicals and many other articles. Virginia is also an agricultural state, producing such crops as tobacco, grains and dairy products, industry is centered principally in Richmond.

Washington, D. C., seat of Federal Government and aside from government jobs has many opportunities in the service trades, markets, transportation and in nearby farm areas.

Living quarters in this area are relatively easy to find except in the major cities where housing shortage is acute. Cooperating committees working with the WRA have been helpful and Federal housing agencies are also cooperating.

## POSTONIANS WARNED AGAINST BLACK WIDOW

People of Poston should be on the look out for spiders of various kinds now hatching, stated Elma Rood, Supervisor of Public Health, with most of these spiders being harmless. However, the black-widow spider, with the red hour-glass on her stomach, is extremely dangerous and should be destroyed whenever found.

If a person is bitten, promptly apply iodine over the bite and the victim should go to the clinic immediately where treatment by the doctor will neutralize the poison and relieve the pain.
