

44 HOUR WEEK ESTABLISHED FOR ALL CENTERS

Under a new employment policy, W.R.A. is cutting down the number of routine evacuee positions at all relocation centers, Director Dillon S. Myer has advised officials here. A revised administrative instruction governing the program has been issued by the Washington office to all relocation centers.

The instruction formally establishes the 44-hour work week at all centers, that not more than one member of a family shall be employed when there are other qualified candidates, not more than 15% of evacuee workers may be paid \$19 and established a system of compensation for extended illness at the rate (Cont. on Page 2)

SEASONAL JOB VISITORS MUST PAY FOR MEALS

Effective Sept. 10, persons on seasonal leave who return to the Center on visits will be required to pay for their food at the rate of 20 cents per meal.

This is in accord with the WRA instruction which states: "When a person upon seasonal leave returns to a relocation center, he shall be required to surrender his leave card unless he is admitted as a visitor, in which event he shall be required to pay for food and lodging in accordance with the provision of the current Administrative Instruction on the subject."

SEGREGANTS LISTED BY BLOCKS

SUGAR FIRM SEEKS 100 WORKERS

The Employment Division announced today that the Franklin County Sugar Co. in Preston, Idaho, needs 100 beet toppers and loaders for seasonal work beginning Oct. 1 and lasting until Nov. 15. Transportation to and from the place of work will be provided by the War Foods Administration, and the workers will be housed either in the homes of farmers or a FSA camp.

The segregation office today announced the preliminary list by blocks of the people who will be moved from Poston to the Tule Lake center. The number given as a total is 1405.

The reduction from the original figure of 1468 was because of the people here who left to sail on the Gripsholm, and by eliminating some duplication of names which appeared previously. This was because the names of some few people appeared in the two groups designated for segregation.

VERNON KENNEDY TO ARRIVE WED.

The Kansas City area, which Kennedy heads, embraces all of Iowa and Missouri and parts of Kansas, Nebraska, and South Dakota.

BAGGAGE ALLOWED EACH SEGREGANT

The amount of baggage which can be checked on each full fare ticket for those people who will go to the Tule Lake center is 150 lbs. On each half fare ticket half this baggage weight is allowed.

Children between the ages of 4 and 12 will require half fare tickets and therefore will be entitled to 75 pounds baggage, it was revealed.

of 60% of their regular wages. Job descriptions which will set forth the duties and responsibilities of each worker in various job categories is now being prepared by the Washington Office. This will insure uniformity in jobs and wages between the different centers and will also help evacuees in advising prospective outside employers. The following grounds listed in the instruction on which any employee may be discharged are: Unexcused absence from work; habitual tardiness and leaving job before quitting time; slackness and inefficiency on the job; and willful or careless misuse of equipment. A fair employment practices procedure is set up whereby any workers who feel that he has been unjustly treated may obtain a hearing.

288 CERTIFICATES GIVEN TO CHILDREN

Of the total number, 65 were given to nursery school children; 47 to kindergarteners, 35 to first graders, 59 to second graders and 82 to third graders.

"These certificates will be of great value to the children in applying for entrance to schools outside of Poston, and parents should preserve them carefully", stated Miss Rood.

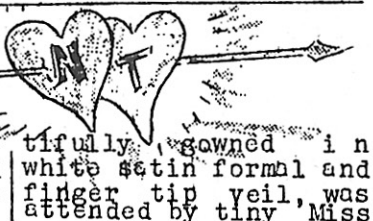
She also stated that every child in Poston should have a certificate indicating that he has been protected against smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough and typhoid.

PENAL CODE OF THE COMMUNITY OF BOSTON

9. **CARRYING CONCEALED WEAPONS** Any person who shall go about in a public place armed with a dangerous weapon concealed upon his person, unless he shall have a permit signed by the Project Director, shall be deemed guilty of carrying a concealed weapon.
10. **ABDUCTION** Any person who shall willfully take away or detain another person against his will or without the consent of the parent or other person having lawful care or charge of him, shall be deemed guilty of abduction.
11. **THEFT** Any person who shall take the property of another person, with intent to steal, shall be deemed guilty of theft.
12. **EMBEZZLEMENT** A. Any person who shall, having lawful custody of property not his own, fraudulently appropriate the same to his own use, or to the use of another, with intent to deprive the owner thereof, shall be deemed guilty of embezzlement.

B. Every officer of this Community, and every officer, director, trustee, clerk, or agent of any trust association, society, or corporation (public or private), who fraudulently appropriates to any use or purpose not in the due and lawful execution of his trust, any property which he has in his possession or under his control by virtue of his trust, or secret it with a fraudulent intent to appropriate it to such use or purpose, is guilty of embezzlement.
13. **FRAUD** Any person who shall by willful misrepresentation or deceit, or by false interpreting, or by the use of false weights or measure, obtain any money or other property with intent to deprive the owner thereof, shall be deemed guilty of fraud.
14. **FORGERY** Any person who shall, with intent to defraud, falsely sign, execute or alter any written instrument, shall be deemed guilty of forgery.
15. **RECEIVING STOLEN PROPERTY** Any person who shall receive or conceal or aid in concealing or receiving any property, knowing the same to be stolen, embezzled, or obtained by fraud or false pretense, robbery or burglary, shall be deemed guilty of receiving stolen property.
16. **EXTORTION** Any person who shall willfully, by making false charges against another person or by any other means whatsoever, extort or attempt to extort any moneys, goods, property or anything else of any value, shall be deemed guilty of extortion.
17. **DISORDERLY CONDUCT** Any person who shall engage in fighting in in a public place, disturb or annoy any public or religious assembly, or appear in a public or private place in any intoxicated and disorderly condition, or who shall engage in any other act of public indecency or immorality, shall be deemed guilty of disorderly conduct.
18. **MALICIOUS MISCHIEF** Any person who shall maliciously disturb, injure or destroy any livestock or other domestic animal or other property, shall be deemed guilty of malicious mischief.
