

INCOME TAX FILING DEADLINE SEPTEMBER 15

AID GRANTS TO BE MAILED RELOCATORS

A declaration computing estimated income and victory tax for 1943 must be filed on or before Sept. 15, with the collector at whose district the taxpayer expects to file his income tax return for 1943, according to Theodore H. Haas, Project Attorney.

The taxpayer must pay at the same time at least one-half of the unpaid balance of the estimated tax for 1943, unless he is a farmer.

A declaration must be made by every citizen or resident of the United States if he comes within any of the following groups:

1. Single persons who made \$2700 or more during 1942 or who expects to make that amount this year.

FUNDS DEPOSITED IN SUMI- TOMO TO BE DISBURSED

The Sumitomo Bank of California at Sacramento has notified the Evacuee Property Office, Room 48 Administration building, that disbursement of funds will be made soon after November first.

Blanks to provide the proper address of depositors have been furnished to the Evacuee Property Office.

There were a number of former residents of the Sacramento area who had accounts in this bank, according to Mills, who sent the communication. Further information will be given through the office if people want to call personally.

Funds for traveling and initial living expenses for evacuees leaving the center on indefinite employment leave will henceforth be paid in the following manner, according to a new ruling of the War Relocation Authority:

1. Fare to the point of destination will be furnished either in the form of a railroad or bus ticket or a government transportation request with which the traveler can buy his own ticket.

2. The three dollars a day for meals and expenses while en route will be paid in cash before the evacuee

leaves the center.

3. The grant for initial living expenses at the place of employment will be sent to the relocation evacuee by mail in care of the relocation officer nearest to his place of employment. Upon arrival, the evacuee may call for the check in person or write the relocation officer asking to have it forwarded to him. Any checks not

CAMERAS WANTED BY U. S. NAVY

Anyone having a camera of certain specifications can sell it to the Navy, it was announced from the Evacuee Property Office. The specifications are: 8 by 10 view camera Agfa Universal model, manufactured by Wollensak, Rochester, N. Y.; suitable for copying, enlarging and reducing with complete diaphragm and color filter.

There are a great many of these cameras in the hands of private owners throughout the country. The Navy department will be glad to purchase a supply of them.

Anyone in Poston having such a camera for sale may notify the Evacuee Property Office of where it is located and the price asked and the office will communicate the offer to the proper officials of the Navy.

TEN EXCHANGEES RETURN HERE

Ten of the 50 people who went from Poston to Gila expecting to sail on the exchange ship Gripsholm are returning to Poston. It was explained that the lists were made up with certain names preferred and that others had been ordered to Gila as alternates.

Those with the more essential priority on the list were taken first and others were not permitted to go because the capacity of the boat had been reached

OVER 2000 OUT ON INDEFINITE LEAVE FROM POSTON

Total number of people who have left the Center on indefinite leave passed 2000 this morning, the Departure Station announced.

Since last week end, when indefinite leaves numbered 1953, 64 more permanent departures have been made, raising the total to 2017.

Employment Division officials believed that this would enable Poston to maintain its lead in the number of people relocated. According to the latest statistics from Washington (as of Aug. 14), Poston was ahead of all the other centers in the number of both indefinite and seasonal leaves issued. In se-

cond place was Minidoka.

This center's total at that time was 1740 indefinite leaves and 1239 seasonal.

"THIS IS AMERICA" TO BE SHOWN

Expected in the center soon is a series of eight 16 MM sound motion pictures under the general title of "This is America," the Employment Division reported today.

The program, intended to stimulate interest in relocation, will run for 42 minutes to 55 minutes, each program being made up of five subjects.

3. Individuals, regardless of marital status, who were required to file an income tax return for 1942 and whose wages subject to withholding for 1943 are reasonably expected to be less than such wages for 1942.

SCHOOL TERM TO START SEPTEMBER 20

The opening of the Poston School session, 1943-1944 school year will begin on September 20th, according to Dr. A. L. Harris, Poston Director of Education.

All the adobe elementary school buildings in Poston I should be completed by that time, and a sufficient number of buildings in Poston II and III should be ready to house the secondary grades.

The Poston I buildings will accommodate only $\frac{1}{2}$ the elementary and $\frac{2}{3}$ the secondary grades.

The remainder of the classes will be conducted in the recreation halls of the various blocks. After the completion of segregation, they will probably be moved into barracks close to the school block.

BUDDHIST SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHER LEAGUE FORMED

At the joint Buddhist S.S. Teachers and Y.B. cabinet and director meeting, it was unanimously approved to form a S.S. Teachers League. This league will operate as an entirely separate unit from Y.B. but cooperation shall exist between the two. Toshi Nishimura of Roku II was elected as the president. She will be assisted by Yurie Honda, Roku III, vice pres., and Hazuyo Iro-uye, Roku I, secretary, and three directors from each Roku will form the rest of the cabinet.

PENAL CODE OF THE COMMUNITY OF BOSTON

19. **TRESPASS** Any person who shall go upon, into, or pass over any apartment, room, building, or lands of another person and shall refuse to go immediately therefrom on the request of the owner or lawful occupant thereof shall be deemed guilty of trespass.
20. **INJURY TO PUBLIC PROPERTY** Any person who shall without proper authority, use or injure any public property of the center, shall be deemed guilty of an offense.
21. **MAINTAINING A PUBLIC NUISANCE** Any person who shall act in such manner, or permit his property to fall into such condition as to injure or endanger the safety, health, comfort, or property of his neighbors, shall be deemed guilty of maintaining a public nuisance.
22. **CRUELTY TO ANIMALS** Any person who shall torture or cruelly mistreat any animal, shall be deemed guilty of cruelty to animals.
23. **PROSTITUTION** Any person who shall practice prostitution or who shall knowingly keep, maintain, rent, or lease, any house, room, or other place for the purpose of prostitution shall be deemed guilty of prostitution.
24. **GIVING VENEREAL DISEASE TO ANOTHER** Any person who shall infect another person with a venereal disease shall be deemed guilty of an offense.
25. **FAILURE TO SEND CHILDREN TO SCHOOL** Any person who shall, without good cause, neglect or refuse to send his children or any children under his care to school during such time as the schools are open and receiving children, shall be deemed guilty of an offense.
26. **CONTRIBUTING TO THE DELINQUENCY OF A MINOR** Any person shall willfully contribute to the delinquency of any minor, shall be deemed of an offense.
27. **BRIBERY** Any person who shall give or offer to give any money, property or service, or anything else of value to another person with corrupt intent to influence another in the discharge of his public duties or conduct, and any persons who shall accept, solicit or attempt to solicit any bribe, as above defined, shall be deemed guilty of bribery.
28. **PERJURY** Any person who shall willfully and deliberately, in any proceeding before the Project Director, or the Judicial Commission falsely swear or interpret, or shall make a sworn statement or affidavit knowing the same to be untrue, or shall induce or procure another person so to do, shall be deemed guilty of perjury.
29. **FALSE ARREST** Any person who shall willfully and knowingly make, or cause to be made, an unlawful arrest, detention or imprisonment of another person, shall be deemed guilty of false arrest.
30. **RESISTING LAWFUL ARREST** Any person who shall willfully and knowingly, by force or violence, resist another person to resist a lawful arrest shall be deemed guilty of resisting lawful arrest.
