

WIFE EXEMPTED UNDER NEW TAX RULING

An evacuee on indefinite leave whose wife remains at the center is entitled to the "exemption of a married person" under the new "as-you-earn" income tax law, according to an informal ruling of the Bureau of Internal Revenue which has been incorporated into an instruction issued by WRA on August 5.

Although an evacuee on leave whose wife and children remain at the center can claim the married person's exemption, the Bureau of Internal Revenue has advised WRA that he cannot ordinarily claim his children as dependents.

This interpretation, was based on the fact that the Government furnishes food, shelter, medical care, and in some cases clothing to (Cont. on Page 2)

LEAVE CLEARANCE HEARING TO BE HELD SOON

A number of Postonians who asked to change their "no" answers when they appeared before the Board for Segregation Review are anxious to relocate, it would seem from the number of inquiries they have made. The fact that they have asked to change their

answers does not make them eligible for leave clearance, it was pointed out at the segregation office. They will still have to appear before the leave clearance board, and unless this leave is granted they cannot take outside jobs.

The fact that they have asked to change their "no" answers does not make them ineligible for segregation, it was also stated. Unless they are granted leave clearance they may yet be designated to go to the Tule Lake center.

The leave clearance hearings are conducted at the project and the data assembled and sent to Washington along with a recommendation made by the Project Director. The question of whether clearance is granted to any particular individual is determined at Washington rather than at the project.

No date has yet been fixed for holding these leave clearance hearings, which are provided for in the segregation program. It is expected that they will be held as soon as possible.

FEDERAL JUDGE OVERRULES

EXCLUSION ORDER

Since the United States is not in immediate danger of attack or invasion by its enemies, Federal Judge J. Cullen Ganey overruled the exclusion order is sued by Lt. Gen. Hugh A. Drum, head of the Eastern Defense Command, excluding Mrs. Olga Schueller, a 53-year-old naturalized citizen of German birth from the Third Corps Area, according to an Associated Press story in the Arkansas Gazette states the Denson Tribune.

This is believed to be the first decision of its kind to be rendered by any Federal Court. Mrs. Schueller's lawyer contended General Drum's order was unconstitutional because it deprived her of a jury trial.

Mrs. Schueller, a restaurant owner in Philadelphia and a resident of this county 33 years has a son in the navy.

MISS ALICE GRUBE ESCORT FOR EXCHANGEES

Miss Alice Grube, one of the counselors in the Family Welfare Department, was a passenger on the Gripsholm on the first exchange made nearly a year ago. Last week she acted as escort for the people from Poston who were scheduled to sail on the Gripsholm today.

She went from here to the Gila Center with the repatriates, and returned to Poston last night. She accompanied the ten persons back from Gila who were not included in the sailing list.

Miss Grube was in Japan when the war started and was one of the American citizens who sailed on the Gripsholm on its first trip for the Red Cross.

children remaining at the project, or "more than 50 percent of the total cost of support."

An exception to the general rule, quoted from the instruction, is as follows: "Where several children are involved and the amount contributed (by the evacuee parent) is less than 50 percent of the total cost of their support, but more than 50 percent of the cost of supporting one of the children, it is permissible for the evacuee to treat his contributions as having been made for the support of a particular child and claim this child as a dependent without claiming the others as dependents."

Balance \$916.56; miscellaneous incomes: cancelled checks \$8.50. Balance on hand, August 31, 1943, \$925.06.

Note: \$70 loan made to Post Office to be reimbursed into the Trust Fund.

\$500 set aside for purchase of fixtures and materials for the Poston Square Garden in event not obtainable thru WRA.

A balance of \$300 to be invested in athletic equipment, such funds to be reverted back to the Trust Fund.

According to the latest statistical report from Washington covering the week ending August 14, Poston leads all other centers in the number of people who are out on seasonal and indefinite leaves.
