An evacuee on indefi nite leave whose wife remains at the center to the is entitled "exemption of a married person" under the "aar-as-you-earn" income tax law, according to en informal ruling of the Bureau of Inter nal Revenue which has! been incorporated into an instruction issued The WRA: on August 5.

Although an evacuee on leave whose wife and children remain at the center can claim the married person's exemption, the Bureau of Internal Rovenue has advised WRA that he cannot ordinarily claim his children as dependents.
