

CONSERVATION OF WRA
PROPERTY URGED

All appointed and evague personnel of the Colorado River War Relocation Project have been asked by the Project Director to help conserve government property because of the existing shortages which make it difficult to replace equipment.

This has been done in response to an Indian Office memorandum from the Secretary of the Interior in regard to the use of all government property including equipment, materials, supplies, buildings and plants.

Every Poston employe has already received a copy of the instructions which "carries with it an individual appointment of each as a trustee of government property."

SEGREGANTS MAY SHIP PETS TO TULE LAKE

Normal household pets belonging to segregants will be shipped by express to Tule Lake at government expense, according to an official announcement. But a pet snake will have to be kissed goodbye, for the shipment of reptiles and dangerous animals is prohibited, and state and interstate health regulations must be adhered to.

The Project will make arrangements for the pets' crating and forwarding, which must meet the carrier's requirements. Since passenger trains and baggage cars will be used for passengers and checkable baggage respectively and exclusively, pets will travel separately.

CRATING OF ARTICLES IN UNDER FUND III COMPLETED

VISITING OF INTERNEES LIMITED TO EMERGENCIES

Hereafter, aliens interned at the Detention Camp in Santa Fe, New Mexico will only be authorized to visit a WRA center when there is serious illness in the immediate family or for similar reason, according to word received from the acting officer in charge of the Santa Fe Detention Station.

Requests are received daily from friends and relatives asking permission for an internee to visit them, since it is impossible that all these requests be granted, the local Family Welfare Office has been asked to assist in arranging visits in strict compliance with the new ruling.

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All the crating of furniture and other bulky articles belonging to segregants has been completed in Units 2 and 3, ahead of schedule under the supervision of Roy Anderson, Charles A. Popkin, Construction Engineer, reported Saturday.

Boxes of Douglas fir measuring 12 cubic feet were made in the local carpenter shops and delivered to the families going to Tule Lake. Crews were organized in each block to do the crating within the block.

Similar crating will begin Monday morning in Unit 1 and is expected to be finished in three days. The amount of freight has been far in excess of the original estimates, Mr. Popkin said.

TEACHERS-STUDENTS VOLUNTEER TO EXPEDITE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

The opening date of the Poston III High School has been postponed as a result of the windstorm which delayed the completion of the adobe class rooms.

In a recent student body assembly, the students voted to hold classes on Saturdays for as many days as necessary to make up the time lost by the delayed opening.

Anxious to start school at the earliest possible date, a large number of students and

teachers are reporting as volunteer workers at the adobe school construction.

NISEI GIRLS ACCEPTABLE FOR NURSE CADET CORPS JOB OPEN IN C.E.

Nisei girls are invited to enlist in the U.S. Cadet Nurse Corps according to the U. S. Public Health Service, a recent memorandum from Dillon S. Myer stated, 65,000 student nurses are needed in 1945 to replace those who have joined and will join the Army and Navy Nurse Corps, and to meet the shortages in civilian and government hospitals, health agencies and war industries.

The opportunity includes: (1) an all-expense paid scholarship to study nursing at an accredited school of the enlistee's choice; (2) free uniforms designed by leading fashion experts--a complete summer and winter outfit, topcoat, reversible raincoat, Montgomery beret, purse, and the insignia of the U. S. Public Health Service and the Maltese Cross of the USCNC; and (3) a salary of \$15 a month as Pro-Cadet in the first 9 mos. of training; \$20 as a Junior Cadet in the next 15 to 20 mos., and at least \$30 as a Senior Cadet until graduation, which will take from 24-30 or 36 mos., depending on the regulations of the state chosen to train in.

Members enrolled 90 days prior to the end of the war may complete their training under the Corps plan. They are not required to pledge themselves to military nursing only, and civilian hospitals will probably retain most of them.

Eligibility requirements state that the applicant must be 17 or 18-35, be in good health married or single, and a high school graduate with an "A" average in school. Opportunities for this training are to be sent to the relocation centers in the same manner that employment offers are now being sent, according to present plans.

Form WRA-156 must be filled out by the owners, giving a description of the pet. Then Fido and Tabby--or maybe your kitten's name is Nicodemus--will be sent on their way.

A \$19 per month job as secretary to Charles M. Belitt, chief of Community Enterprises, is open to a qualified stenographer. It was announced today by the Employment Division. Applicants may call for an interview at the Community Enterprises administrative building in Block 34. It was pointed out that knowledge of Japanese was not necessary, and that the duties of the position do not include taking notes on night meetings.

OUTSIDE JOB OFFERS DECREASE 27.3 PER CENT

Total number of outside job offers submitted to the Project in August decreased 27.3 per cent from the previous month, dropping from 395 to 287, statistics released by Tats Kushida, head of the Outside Employment Department, revealed today.

Primary reason for the decrease in offers was attributed to segregation, which resulted in many outside opportunities being channelled to Tule Lake, in order to encourage non-segregants to relocate.

A breakdown of job offers in August indicated that approximately 17.8 per cent for industrial workers; 17 per cent for agricultural workers; 7.3 per cent, professional technical; 5.2 per cent, clerical; and 1.8 per cent, miscellaneous.

Total number of applications to the 287 offers was 44.

CO-OPERATION ON CIVIC PROJECT LAUDED

The construction on the Boston Square Garden swimming pool is expected to be completed within two weeks, according to the views expressed by those in charge of the project. The aquatic project will be bordered by a concrete sidewalk, and a circular wading pool is being planned to occupy the adjacent area south of the pool.

The amphitheatre stage will be rebuilt by using the lumber that is to be taken from the 310 stage, and the foundation for the dancing pavilion east of the swimming pool, has already been leveled off.

The rapid progress made to date has been due to the fine co-operation shown by the Unit III residents, said one of the men in charge. Many of the hardest and the most co-operative workers that have volunteered for work in the Boston Square Garden have been those who are scheduled to go to Tule Lake. Despite the fact that they will not remain in Boston to enjoy the pleasures to be derived from the Garden, they have been generous in their time spent toward the civic project.

Much credit also should be extended to the 322 tractor drivers for their genial co-operation.

With a little more co-operation the Boston Square Garden will be quickly completed, it was stated.
