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WEIGHING OF CHECKABLE BAGGAGE STARTED THURSDAY

With the picking up of segregant's freight completed in all three camps, preliminary weighing of all checkable baggage began Thursday in the three units under the supervision of the block managers, according to William C. Barrett, Chief Dispatcher. This

is being done to facilitate baggage pick-up when the trains leave for Tule Lake.

Segregants who have baggage in excess of the 150 lbs. allowed for each full-fare ticket and the 75 lbs. for each half-fare, and feel the extra baggage to be necessary, may send it express collect to Tule Lake. Such baggage should be sent as soon as possible and must be paid for by the owners.

Present plans state that the checkable baggage will be picked up on Oct. 3 at 8 a.m. for those leaving on the first train; on Oct. 4 for those on the second train; and on Oct. 6 for the last train. However, Mr. Barrett emphasized that the schedule was tentative and subject to change.

LEAVE CLEARANCE HEARINGS UP TO DATE

Unit II is up to date on the leave clearance hearing files sent from Washington, Unit III is almost up to date and hearings are being accelerated in Unit I, Ted Haas, chairman of the Leave Clearance Hearing Board, revealed Thursday.

To show the proportion of cases being heard in each camp, Mr. Haas gave an example of the first 120 cases which were heard, 50 being in Unit I, 52 in II, and 20 in III.

Strict enforcement of traffic regulations and speed will be enforced in the camps and on the highways leading to the units, stated V. H. Spanswick, Chief of Internal Security.

The camps and highways will be patrolled 24 hours a day by patrol cars stated Mr. Spanswick. Anyone caught violating the traffic regulations will be summoned to appear before Mr. Spanswick in Unit 2.

The cause for strict enforcement of regulations are due to excess speed due to better roads and commencement of schools with more children on the streets.

Mr. Spanswick, formerly an official escort working out of San Francisco and a resident of Salinas is an experienced policeman filling the vacancy left by Ernest Miller.

POSTON SETS PACE IN RELOCATION RACE

Forty evacuees, constituting the largest contingent to go out of Poston on indefinite leave for points east, left last Tuesday night and raised the total number of permanent departures to over 2200, the Employment Division reported.

Employment officials believed that this would increase Poston's lead in the number of residents resettled. According to the latest figures available, the WRA statistics of Aug. 28, this Center set the pace in the relocation race with 1905 indefinite leaves. Minidoka was second with 1796.

But in percentage of indefinite leaves to remaining population, Poston ranked sixth, behind Minidoka, Granada, Topaz, Rohwer, Jerome, and Heart Mountain.

Current Center population is 14,600, it was stated.

1. QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS

All persons who have been bona fide residents of Boston for the past four months or more and are eighteen years of age or over shall be qualified to vote. Each block council or block manager's office shall compile a list of the eligible voters in its block. A copy of this list must be submitted to the City Clerk's Office ten (10) days prior to the election date.

2. NOMINATION

- Each Block shall determine the manner in which nominations shall be made for the office of Local Council.
- In addition to the method or methods of nomination determined by the block, any qualified person may also be nominated for the office of Local Council by a petition signed by not less than ten (10) eligible voters from that particular block.
- The names of such nominee or nominees shall be filed with the City Clerk not later than fifteen (15) days before election. The names of such nominee or nominees shall be filed with the City Clerk on a date which shall be set by him and which shall not be less than ten (10) days and not earlier than fifteen (15) days before the election.

3. VOTING

- Each block manager shall construct in his office a polling booth properly screened to insure secrecy.
- The poll shall be opened on election day from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m.
- Each qualified voter shall receive a ballot from the election board at the poll and shall be allowed one minute in the polling booth to cast his vote.
- The voter shall fold his ballot and deposit it in the voting box, which shall be provided in each polling place.
- Each candidate may remain at the polls on election day or have one representative present.

4. ELECTION BOARD

An election board shall be appointed for each block consisting of one member of the block manager's staff and one person appointed by the block council. At least one member of the board must remain at the polls during the election hours. The duties of the election board shall be as follows:

- Supervise voting
- Check votes against list of eligible voters
- Count ballots and certify the count
- Place votes in sealed envelope
- Deliver sealed envelope to collector

5. COLLECTION OF BALLOTS AND BALLOT BOXES

The block manager supervisor's staff shall collect sealed envelopes containing counted ballots and ballot boxes and give a receipt for same to each election board. The staff shall deliver these articles at once to the Office of the City Clerk, who shall hold them for thirty days.

6. FIRST MEETING OF LOCAL COUNCIL

The Local Councilmen shall be inducted into office within five (5) days after election. The former local chairman of the Council shall act as chairman pro-tem for the first Local Council meeting, and it shall be the responsibility of the chairman to determine the time and place of the meeting. Before determining the time, he will check with the Project Director so that the Director or someone designated by him may be present at the meeting for the purpose of administering the oath of office to the Councilmen.
