- 1. CUALIFICATION OF VOTERS
 All persons who have been bona fide residents of Poston for the
 past four months or more and are eighteen years of age or over
 shall be qualified to vote. Each block council or thock manager's
 office shall compile a list of the cligible voters in its block.
 A copy of this list must be submitted to the City Clerk's Office
 ten (10) days prior to the election date.
 2. NOMINATION
 - a. Each Block shall determine the menner in which nominations shall be made for the office of Local Council.
 - b. In addition to the method or methods of nomination determined by the block, any qualified person may also be nominated for the office of Local Council by a petition signed by not, less than ten (10) eligible voters from that particular block.
 - c. The names of such mominee or nominees shall be filed with the City Clerk not later than fifteen (15) days before election. The names of such nominee or nominees shall be filed with the City Clerk on a date which shall be set by him and which shall not be less then ten (10) days and not earlier than fifteen (15) days before the election.
- a. Fach block manager shall construct in his office a polling
 - booth properly screened to insure secrecy.

 b. The poll shall be epened on election day from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m.

 c. Each qualified boter shall receive a ballot from the election beard at the poll and shall be allowed one minute in the polling booth to exist his mote.
 - d. The veter shall fold his ballot and deposit it in the veting box, which shall be provided in each polling place.
 - e. Each candidate may remain at the polls on election day or have one representative present.
 - An election board shall be appointed for each block consisting of one member of the block manager's staff and one person appointed by the block consciul. At least one member of the board must remain at the polls during the election hours. The duties of the election board shall be as follows:
 - (1) Supervise voting (2) Check votes against list of eligible voters
 - (3) Count ballots and certify the count
 - (4) Place votes in sealed envelope (5) Deliver sealed envelope to collector
- The lock manager supervisor's staff shall collect scaled enverlopes containing counted ballots and ballot boxes and give a receipt for same to each election beard. The staff shall deliver these artisles at once to the Office of the City Clerk, who shall
- The Local Councilmen shall be inducted into effice within five (5) days after election. The former local chairman of the Council shall act as chairman protem for the first local Council meeting, and it shall be the responsibility of the chairman to determine the time and place of the meeting. Before determining the time, he will shock with the Froject Director so that the Director or someone designated by him may be present at the meeting for the purpose of administering the eath of effice to the Councilmen.
