Mochi-gome for the new years mochi has been purchased, stated C.E. Snelson, Chief Project Steward. The purchasing of the rice at an early date will give the residents ample time to prepare for whatever equipment are needed for processing the mochi.

A number of blocks have purchased small amounts of tuna and sea-bass to be served as "sashimi", stated Mr. Snelson, and this leads then to believe that this type of fish is available in large shipments but according to the Los Angeles Quartermaster, this variety is very hard to obtain.

Mr. Snelson stated that 45,000 pounds of daikon is expected from Tule Lake during October besides other vegetables.

"I wish to praise the mess operations workers for their attention to duty under the changing conditions by segregation", stated Mr. Snelson.

Working in cooperation with the WRA, local residents of Japanese ancestry have provided a building in Pocatello, Idaho, to be used as a stopping place for men coming to work in this area or other cities who are unable to find accommodations, Edward Berman, relocation officer of Pocatello district reported.

Mr. and Mrs. Mike Yamashita and their two children, who have relocated in Pocatello will reside at the building, taking care of the building and welcoming the evacuees.

The hostel is located at 143 N. Fourth Street, Pocatello. A fee of 50 cents will be charged for upkeep and tea and coffee.

Accommodations for women evacuees have been made at the YWCA.
