INDIAN SERVICE TO WITHDRAW FROM POSTON JANUARY 1st

ALLIGATOR KILLED IN COLORADO RIVER

A ferocious alligator, 10 feet 3 inches and weighing about 500 pounds was killed a few days ago by residents of Blythe in the wilds of the Colorado River about 30 miles north

With the turn of the New Year, management of the Colorado River War Relocation Center will pass entirely into the hands of the War Relocation Authority, according to information released by W. Wade Head, project director, on his return from Washington this week. The center is now operating under the joint direction of the Indian Affairs branch of the Department of the Interior and the War Relocation Authority.

The change means little, as far as the residents of the center are concerned, Mr. Head stressed in making the announcement to a joint meeting of the Community Council, the local councils, block managers and city hall staff members of all three units, held in Ward 7 at the hospital Thursday afternoon.

Administrative officers and appointed personnel will remain here at Poston in the same positions they now occupy, it is planned. Construction, subjugation and all other work will be continued on the same basis. In fact, Mr. Head declared, nothing will be changed as far as actual operation of the center is concerned. The only difference, as far as the evacuees and personnel are concerned, is that their pay checks will be drawn

Tues. morning.

Young Imoto was at work on the roof of the elementary school auditorium building when he slipped and grasped at the wires to keep from falling. He hung from the wires with both hands until a co-worker loosened him with a broom. Rushed to the hospital, he was given artificial respiration for over two hours, without success.

He leaves his mother, Kimi Imoto of 37-7-D. A sister, Ruby, was a dentist at the clinic until she left last September to work at the Forsyth Dental Infirmary in Boston, Mass. Thomas, a brother, left for Detroit last Aug. The family was formerly of Costa Mesa, Calif.

The victim was a 1938 graduate of the U. of California with a B.S. degree, and came to Poston early this year after receiving an ho-

These board members are devoting from 50 to 80% of their time on the leave clearance dockets, it was said.

FRESH MILK DELIVERY TO RESUME TODAY

C.E. Snelson, Chief steward, announced yesterday that the fresh milk delivery to Poston will resume today with the dairy delivering the milk by their own trucks.

Through the untiring efforts of Mr. Snelson, the project will be able to get 2500 quarts of milk daily. It is expected that the amount of milk will be ample to supply the needs for the babies, invalids and expectant mothers. During the curtailment, Poston was receiving only 300 quarts every other day.

PROJECT ATTORNEY DESCRIBES BASIS OF INTERNMENT

(Ed. Note: Since questions have arisen concerning the internment of alien enemies, Theodore Hays, Project attorney describes briefly below the legal basis for their detention or internment.)

All citizens of hostile nation or government, fourteen years of age or within the United States and not naturalized, are liable to be apprehended as alien enemies, according to Section 21, Title 50 of the United States Code. The President is authorized to establish regulations necessary for the public safety, stated Theodore Hays, Project Attorney. Pursuant to this statutory authority the President issued proclamations and regulations.

The alien suspected of actual hostility to the United States or other crime against the public safety is given a hearing before an alien enemy hearing board, which is under the administrative control of the Alien Enemy Control Unit of the Department of Justice headed by Edward J. Ennis. The alien is ordered detained or released upon the basis of the hearing.

Most of the alien enemies of Japanese ancestry have been interned at Santa Fe Detention Camp, Santa Fe, New Mexico, whose Officer in Charge is Loyd H. Jensen. The Alien Enemy Internment camps are administered by the Department of Justice and the War Department.

POSTON MAY GET SOYBEAN MILK

Poston will soon have ersatz milk made from soybeans to alleviate the lack caused by the nation-wide milk shortage, if all goes well with the equipment which the Steward's department has obtained from Phoenix.

At present it is planned to experiment with the milk substitute in Unit III only, in conjunction with the tofu industry which will supply the soybeans. If the milk agrees with Poston palates, arrangements will be made to have the milk made available to the other units.

Soy bean milk has a higher protein content than cow's milk and is said to be richer in minerals.

Poston is cleaner and greener than their former home in the eyes of former Tuleans who arrived here Monday morning as transfers. Alice Hirahara, who came with her parents, brother and sister, exclaimed at the coldness. "We expected it to be terribly hot," she said. She hadn't had much chance to look around camp, but she thought she would like it here. "Tule is bare, and it's nice to have trees again." The Hirahara's apartment in Block 32 is fronted with a line of tall, slim tamarack trees.

"We like Poston much better," Mrs. Nakamoto, another newcomer from Tule said. She, her husband and three children are now at home in Block 31. Entangled in home-making, she hasn't seen the rest of Poston yet, but her first impression was of the neatness, she said. The Nakamoto family is originally from Selma where they had a farm.

The pretty sisters, Mary and Amy, have located themselves in Block 2; and Kin and Sajiro Miyeda are now additions to the Unit II population.

D.C. ALLOWS ONLY \$5000 FOR LIBRARIES

The library fund question raised recently by K.J. Takashima, chairman of the Unit III Council, in a memorandum to the Project Director recalls the manner in which the library budget for Boston was set up, Dr. John Powell, C.A. director states.

It was not generally understood, Dr. Powell says, that though the San Francisco office of the WRA originally allotted \$14,000 for purposes of establishing a school and community libraries, the budget returned by the Washington offices of the WRA and Indian Service to Miles Cary, then director of education, allowed only \$5000 of this figure for the setting up a library in this center.

All the above, however, applies to the fiscal year 1943, and the fund mentioned has already been used for the allotted purpose.

The library budget for this year has not yet been officially approved, but it will probably amount to \$12,000, T.D. Culbertson, Chief Proprietary Accountant, disclosed.
