

THOUSAND OF TULE RESIDENTS ON STRIKE

Fourteen thousand segregants, residents of the Tule Lake Center were under strong Army Guard and a double barbed-wire fence yesterday as a result of a strike in the Northern California Center, leading Pacific Coast newspapers stated.

It was disclosed that the truck accident resulting in a death of one farm worker and injuries to several others was the excuse for the strike.

Hundreds of evacuees from other centers have volunteered to harvest the hundreds of acres of crop that still remains to be harvested most of which will be shipped to supply the other centers.

It is stated the strike is well in the hands of the WRA officials.

Approximately 44 Poston men had signed up by Friday noon in answer to an SOS call sent by R. B. Cozzens, assistant WRA field director, to nearby centers to help harvest crops at Tule Lake which are endangered by oncoming freezing weather due to a non-violent labor controversy at the segregation camp. REORGANIZATION OF LOCAL EMPLOYMENT DIVISION SEEN RELOCATION AND EMPLOYMENT DEPARTMENTS TO SPLIT

INDIANAPOLIS STILL OPEN FOR RELOCATION

A rumor circulating among the evacuees residing in the Indianapolis area to the effect that that area is closed for relocation is indefinitely untrue. Herbert Kono, WRA officer of Indianapolis disclosed in a wire received by Project Director W. Wade Head.

Reorganization of the employment division with a resulting split up of the division into (1) the Relocation and Leaves Division and (2) Personnel Management Section of the administrative management division has been announced by Harold James and Duncan Mills, visiting officials from Washington.

The Relocation and Leaves Division will be responsible to the project director while the Personnel Management Section will be responsible to the assistant project director in charge of administrative management, in accordance with the letter received from Dillon Myer, WRA Director, a few days ago, authorizing the new program.

The purpose of the change, Mr. James said, is to strengthen the relocation program, and to set up a division which will be able to devote all its time to personnel management functions.

DEADLINE FOR TFR-500 EXTENDED

Extension of the date for the filling out of Form TFR-500 by persons with foreign property holdings has been announced by Ted Haas, project attorney. The original deadline, Nov. 1, 1943, has been postponed one month to Dec. 1, 1943, according to the information received from Acting Sec. of Treasury Randolph Paul.

The census of foreign property holdings began June 3 of this year, and the data obtained from it will be valuable "in proportion to the percentage of persons who report,"

the letter from Mr. Paul said. Those with in the center who have such holdings and have not yet filled out the TFR are urged to do so immediately at their legal offices.

(cont. from page 1) personnel management section will be able to serve the employment needs of the project better by devoting its full time to project employment needs."

Under the new program it is planned that both evacuee and appointed personnel management will be handled under procedures recognized by the Civil Service Commission. Responsibilities of the new division will include labor relations, vocational and job training, job analysis to determine labor needs of the center, selection and placement, job classification according to Civil Service standards, and testing to determine candidates' qualifications for jobs within the center.

The new set-up will go into effect immediately and, it was emphasized, will, as far as possible, utilize existing personnel. Charles B. Olds has been detailed from the Baltimore Maryland Relocation office as counselor to strengthen the relocation staff at Boston.

SUMITOMO CLAIM DEADLINE

In answer to an inquiry from Thomas Masuda, Boston attorney, George H. Mills, special deputy connected with the Sumitomo Bank of California, in liquidation, confirmed the fact that Nov. 1, 1943 has been set as the deadline for filing claims against the bank.

So far, Mr. Mills reported, the filing of claims has been very good and the prospects for paying 100% on all deposits after Nov. 1, are certain.

More men are being recruited to fill the 150 quota set for Boston. In a one-month to six-weeks period, the workers will attempt to save Tule's \$500,000 agricultural harvest, mainly potatoes, before the freeze sets in. They are being offered 90¢ to \$1 an hour and will receive board and room for \$1 a day. Housing will be provided 3½ miles away from the Newell center, in army tents equipped with stoves, floors, cots and blankets.

Giles Zimmerman, Chief of employment, emphasized the importance of saving the crops. Not only will irreplaceable materials go to waste, he said, but a lack of response will have a detrimental effect on the evacuees and the relocation program.

FIVE JAPANESE WOMEN HELD BY F.B.I.

Five Japanese women, one carrying a small baby, were in custody of the F.B.I. in Trinidad, Colorado, on a farm where Japanese Americans from the Amache Relocation Center were employed on seasonal leave, for investigation aroused from the discovery of pictures which showed Japanese women in the embrace of German prisoners of war, six of whom escaped from a near-by internment camp recently.

The publications of the pictures in the Denver Post taken from one of the prisoners of war captured showing the prisoner and two other identified men in the arms of Japanese women apparently led the FBI to an investigation of the matter.
