

**ASSISTANCE GRANTS ALTERED**

Subsistence allowance for evacuee families relocating hereafter will be calculated on family size and needs, according to word received today by Project Director W. Wade Head.

The new plan provides for the same transportation allowances that have heretofore been allotted but permits a 5-day subsistence allowance of \$25 for each person making the trip regardless of the number in a family. Under the old procedure, no family was allotted a subsistence allowance of more than \$100.

**NEW PROCEDURE FOR EMPLOYMENT**

**UNIT 2 REPAIRS 20,000 SHOES**

M. Fozeni, instructor and manager of Unit II Shoe Repair Shop, revealed that to date approximately 10,000 pairs of shoes have been accepted for repair. Presently five operators are employed, averaging about 20 repairs and 10 immediate sewing jobs daily. Mr. Fozeni have asked the patrons to refrain from complaining since voluntary apprentice have been hired in place of permanent skilled operators taken ill, causing temporary decrease in repairs.

He also announced that all patrons must present their tickets in order to receive their shoes. Claimants losing their tickets must identify their shoes and give their signature, and will receive their shoes if no other claimants are found.

To change from one job from another it will not longer be necessary to obtain the approval of Ed. Nossoff, but the approval of the department head will still be required.

To acquire notice of assignment papers, the department head and employment office's signature will be necessary and also the approval of T.D. Culbertson, Chief Accountant.

Dept. head can also withhold the release if replacement cannot be made in any important job.

## VOICE OF AN ISSEI

## IS THE TIDE TURNING?

For those who adhere themselves to pessimistic view that the world is full of misery and life but one long continuity of a good-for-nothing drudgery, I offer a line from the world famous agnostic, Ingersol's "Indictment of modern civilization".

"When I take into consideration the agony of civilized life---the number of failure, the poverty, the anxiety, the hunger, the crime, the humiliation, the shame---I am almost forced to say that cannibalism, after all, is the most merciful form in which man has ever lived upon the fellow man." What a dreadful picture. But the trouble is that these things seem to be quite true.

Obviously, some of us who took everything in a down-spirited way since the mass evacuation, Ingersol's definition on the civilized life might have quite a convincing effect on his mind. But it appears that this famous agnostic has looked intensively into the darker phase of our civilization only and has come out with such a pessimistic conviction on the existing state of men and things of the world. One must avoid extremity and before we point out accusing fingers at evils, we must also look into the brighter side of present day civilization. Of course one does not have to remain an optimist all his life. But it would be far better to follow the Confucian doctrine of taking the middle course and remain cool and unprejudiced even under reverse circumstances and look forward to a brighter future.

In looking back, we find that soon after the outbreak of the Pacific war, the angry tidal wave of public sentiment swept over the entire continent against Japanese and things Japanese and it was so fierce that it almost drowned us in the sea of enmity.

For nearly one whole year after the mass evacuation, the entire atmosphere was full of scathing criticism of Japanese character. But by degrees, as the months sped away, the denunciation of Japanese character, began to be less formidable and somewhat, had toned down and today, the tide is actually turning.

The fair play is the general trait of the American people and it is inherent with the American character. They began to see the difference between Japan and the Japanese Americans. The fearful apprehension or sitting on top of a volcano seems to be eased off from our mind and we are breathing more easily than ever before.

Yes, the tide is now slowly but surely turning. And one must keep in mind that after all, the civilization means the humanization of men in society and that one's aim in life should be directed to this end, that is, of remaking the world safe for the true democracy. K.T.

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR LIGHTING HEATERS

Project Director W. Wade Head released the following instructions to the residents regarding the use of heaters to prevent any possible fire hazard that may occur during the winter.

1. Remove the top grill and raise the burner lid.
2. Turn Fuel Control No. 1, and when you see the oil entering the pot, place match in the wire holder and lower to the wick in the bottom of the pot. The wick and oil will ignite. Close the burner lid and replace the top grill. The flame can be watched through the hole in the burner lid. The usual burning is between No. 2 and 3 setting.
3. To increase the heat supply, simply open the fuel control gradually and slowly until the desired heat is obtained, but under no circumstance ever turn the control valve above No. 3 as an explosion might occur.
4. In case the flame goes out, do not attempt to again light the stove until the stove is cold, as an accumulation of gas in the stove might cause an explosion.
5. If the stove does not operate properly, immediately turn the stove off and notify the Maintenance Department. Do not attempt to regulate or adjust valves.
6. Place box or can of sand near the heater to be used in case of fire.
7. Do not hang clothing or other articles near or above the heater.
8. Place container of water on top of heater when heater is in use.
9. Keep one window open at least 3 inches when heater is being used, as carbon monoxide which is very detrimental to the health might accumulate in the room.
10. Under no circumstance ever leave the stove lit unattended, in the barrack when going to the movies, talent shows, parties, etc.

### COMMUNICABLE AND INFECTIOUS DISEASE SUMMARY RELEASED

Eight active cases of tuberculosis were reported by the Unit III clinic for the month of October. Other communicable diseases were influenza, acute infectious conjunctivitis and syphilis. 14 typhoids, 18 pertussis 17 diphtheria, 3 small pox inoculations were given but all have not been completed. Of the 3042 tuberculosis skin tests given, the results of the 2739 readings were 1805 positives and 534 negatives.

Physical examinations were given 96 segregants who left for Tule Lake, 13 school children, and 4 seasonal workers.

3 births and 1 death were recorded for Oct.
