Nisei Army volunteers will hereafter be placed on the reserve list after they are inducted at Salt Lake City and no 21 day furlough will be granted as has heretofore, stated R. L. Porter of the Arizona State Headquarters of Selective Service System.

duction of citizens of Japanese ancestry is authorized. This will be done in accordance with the provisions of instructions under which the present induction has been accomplished.

Japanese are to be forwarded to one station, 179 Motor Avenue, Salt Lake City, Utah. It is the plan of the War Department now to induct eligible citizens of Japanese ancestry and place them in the Enlisted Reserve Corps subject to call to active duty by the War Department."

United States Citizens of Japanese ancestry who are about to be inducted should be informed before leaving the Relocation Project for the Induction Station that they will not be granted a twenty-one day furlough as has heretofore been the procedure, but will be released after induction to civilian life and will be subject to call to active duty by the War Department. The length of time in which they will remain in the Enlisted Reserve Corps has not been ascertained by this headquarters.

**LOYALS REMOVED
FROM TULE**

The Associated Press disclosed that 370 evacuees of all ages, in a joyful mood, the last of the Japanese to prove loyalty to the United States were removed from Tule Lake by train, Nov. 11, to WRA camps in Utah, Idaho, Colorado and Arkansas.

TULE LAKE PROJECT DIRECTOR RELATES INCIDENT

Due to many inaccurate stories that are appearing in papers, the Chronicle has received the following true story direct from Project Director R. R. Best of Tule Lake concerning the Northern California incident through teletype Friday.

TULE LAKE, CALIF.--The Tule Lake Center, made up principally of evacuees who wish to go to Japan or who have evidenced disloyalty to the United States, has been quiet during the past week with the army in control.

The WRA is still carrying on routine administrative functions under the direction of army officials who assumed charge of the fifteen thousand population camp the night of Nov. 4 at the request of Project Director R. R. Best. A number of the gang of three hundred to four hundred young Japanese men armed with sticks and clubs who moved into the administration area about 9:45 p.m. the night of Nov. 4 were seized, Mr. Best said, in fights with WRA staff members just before the army moved in. None received gunshot wounds. Best indicated that the army and WRA are taking steps to round up others in the gang of troublemakers which has been causing discord in the Segree Center since early October. A WRA Internal Security Officer, Edward F. Borbeck, was injured in the disturbance the night of Nov. 4.

The administrative area is now completely cut off by a high fence from the Japanese colony. Since the army moved in, no evacuee workers have returned to the administrative offices, although small crews since Tuesday have been unloading coal and food and moving garbage. No one is permitted to go into the Japanese colony without army escort. "In our opinion the majority of the Japanese residents would not question the authority of the WRA or the army" Best said. "However, since segregation we have been aware that we have in this center Japanese who would go to any lengths to cause trouble to the United States government in the belief that in so doing they would be aiding Japan. Knowing this we have been ready to ask the Army to act on short notice. The group of troublemakers has seized every opportunity to make major issues out of minor grievances of the residents in the effort to gain political control of the whole Japanese population for their own personal prestige and to serve the Japanese Emperor. Labor trouble was stirred up by agitators among the coal crews and farm workers.

"The boldest move by the group occurred Nov. 1 when Dillon S. Myer, WRA Director, visited the Tule Lake Center. He was not scheduled to meet with the Japanese representatives until the next day. Yet it was announced in all dining halls at noon that all the evacuees were to go to the Administration area to hear a talk by Mr. Myer. As a result of this hoax, between thirty-five hundred and four thousand men, women, and children streamed up from the colony to the Administration building. A well organized group of perhaps two hundred aggressive young men directed the movements of the crowd and also told WRA staff members to remain in the Administration or other buildings. Their language and actions were rough but there was no fighting. The WRA Staff realized that a single incident would endanger many innocent people, and such an occurrence could have been used by Japan to retaliate against Americans held by them. The advisability of calling in the army which was lined up at the edge of the project ready to act was seriously considered. In view of the fact that the crowd was orderly, that it contained many women and children brought there by a hoax, and that the crowd was between the Army Post and the Administration Building, it was decided to avoid possible bloodshed which in all probability would have been inevitable under the circumstances if the army had been called in. While the crowd stayed outside, Mr. Myer, Mr. Cozzens and myself met in my office with a group of seventeen Japanese who said they represented the colony. While this meeting was in progress we received word that ten to twelve thugs had beaten Dr. Reece Pedicord, Chief Medical Officer of the Project, in his office at the Hospital. The meeting was held up until we were assured by the visit of a staff member to Dr. Pedicord that he was safe. "Mr. Myer told the committee and the crowd that he did not act upon demands, and assured them that the WRA and the evacuees could get together to discuss and settle any problems."

Two hundred thirty-seven evacuees from relocation centers and outside are working fourteen to sixteen hours a day to harvest the crop of the Tule Lake Project Farm which the Tule Lake Segregates refused to touch. Among the group of farm workers are from Boston. A special train Wednesday left the Tule Lake Center with evacuees who had been scheduled to be transferred during the segregation movement. Among them were ninety going to Minnidoka.

TWO CIVIL SERVICE JOBS OPEN

Former employment chief Vernon Kennedy, who is Relocation Supervisor of WRA office in Kansas City at the present, announced two civil service job openings for evacuees.

One job is open at the new Reports and Publicity Officer's office in Kansas City which pays \$2190 per year or \$182.50 a month. Anyone who has majored in English or has studied journalism and can take shorthand can qualify.

The second is for general office work, some stenography and the ability to compose simple letters. The pay will be \$1970.88 per year or \$164.24 a month. Further details may be obtained from the Employment Division.

According to the C.E. prices will be about \$19 in 100 lbs. lots while in small amounts additional charges will be made. Azuki beans and kinako are now being sold in all centers.
