TED HAAS RETURNS FROM ARIZONA CASE

Ted Haus, Project Attorney, and Dr. John Powell, Director of Community Activities, both attended the twohour hearing in Phoenix of the State of Arizona vs. Tsutomu J.keda and the Johnson-Pearce Commercial Company on Monday.

According to Mr. Haus, four attorneys, led by the former chief just-ice of the Arizona Court, Alfred Supreme Lockwood, an argued that 187 unconstitutional RHW because it is "ambiguous, arbitrary and unreasonable," and is a violation of the state and federal constitutions.

Seasonal workers from Poston played a major part in Western Colora do agriculture, helping to harvest 245 acres of peaches and 465 acres of tomatoes for growers, a report from Harold M. Routh, relocation officer for Western Colorado, reveals.

The total number of workers from the cenfor harvesting ters peaches, tomatoes and planting beets in this area was 433, and of this number, practical ly one-half, 215, were ly one-half, 215, were recruited from Poston. Of this figure, 116 wo rkers did orchard work, 90 pocked tomatoes and 9 helped with the sugar beets.
